The original lock was built by the North West Company for canoes and bateaux. It was burned during the War of 1812. The lock was reconstructed in 1896 by Mr. Francis H. Clergue on the foundations of the original.

### North West Company/Hudson's Bay Company Post

The North West Company's fur-trading post was built south of the river in 1791. In 1797 the post was moved to the north side of the river after the British abandoned their occupation of the American Midwest.

It later became a post for the Hudson's Bay Company with the union of the two companies in 1821.
