Cultural Heartland of Ojibwe People

- History as a gathering place for First Nations people to fish, and to renew kinship and ceremonial ties.
- Strong presence of First Nations people and Metis in the river valley
- Whitefish Island, once one of the largest First Nations settlements in the upper Great Lakes, was inhabited from 200 BC to 1895

Jesuit missionaries describe scoop net fishing methods – "Dexterity and strength are needed for this kind of fishing; for one must stand upright in a bark Canoe, and there, among the whirlpools, with muscles tense, thrust deep into the water a rod, at the end of which is fastened a not made in the form of a pocket, into which the fish are made to enter. One must look for them as they glide between the Rocks . . . and, when they have been made to enter the net, raise them with a sudden strong pull into the canoe."

- North West Company Trading post on north shore
