

Heritage Properties in Sault Ste. Marie

1900 - 1906

Central United Church

160 Spring Street

The church was originally designed by Toronto architect Henry Simpson, and built over the period from 1900-1911.

It is constructed of roughly squared sandstone blocks, derived from local sources. It is a unique building, with its massive four storey bell tower, turrets, buttresses, diamond-paned leaded glass windows, and octagonal sanctuary with steeply pitched roofs.

Coronation-Hussey Block

234 - 246 Queen Street East


These downtown buildings built by local architect H. Russell Halton are examples of the Romanesque Revival style and built with local sandstone.

Old Post Office

690 Queen Street East

Designed in 1902 by David Ewart, Chief Architect of the federal Department of Public Works, its Victorian Classical style is typical of federal architecture at the turn of the 20th century. Exterior features include classical pediments, pilasters and cornices, as well as Romanesque stone arches and Italianate detailing.

The building is now the home of the Sault Ste. Marie Museum.

Residence

115 Upton Road

Typical of residences being built for a growing middle class, as the economy of the city expanded and it's prosperity increased. The design elements are characteristic of the Queen Anne style

Residence - Eastbourne

1048 Queen Street East

Eastbourne was the home of Sir William Hearst, who was the Premier of Ontario from 1914 to 1919. Its design elements are characteristic of the domestic version of Edwardian Classicism. It was built of soft red brick and local sandstone in a 't-shaped' plan, with each of the arms the same width and projection.

McLeod Family Residence

143 McGregor Avenue

Its design elements are characteristic of the Queen Anne style. Building materials include local clay brick, local sandstone and wooden windows and gables. The circular two storey turret with conical cedar shingle roof is capped with a pinnacle.
