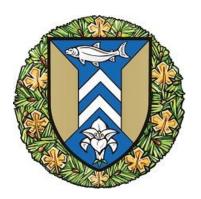

The four AWC leaders guide how the AWC delivers support to its members, but consistent with its 'collective' nature, the AWC emphasis placed on inclusivity ensures that any Sault writer seeking guidance regarding how to navigate the often tricky Canadian and international publishing world has the ability to obtain sound, reliable information at every step of the way.

Our proposed 'Fresh Eyes - Sault Ste Marie 2025' project ('Project') is a unique Sault creative community undertaking. For the first time in our City's history (and perhaps ever in Canadian creative community history), a select team of eight accomplished photographers will 'shoot the City, turning their lenses and imagination loose across the Sault over a five day period (May 7 through 11, 2025). The photographers will regularly upload their work over this period to the Project HQ, a publicly accessible hotel conference room.

Commencing on Project Day 2, the public (including any Sault residents, elementary / secondary school groups, Sault College and Algoma University students, and City visitors alike) can visit Project HQ free of charge to view the photographers' work in progress. We anticipate that by Project Day 5, there will be several hundred fresh Sault images on display at Project HQ.

Further, anyone visiting Project HQ wishing to comment on any of the images displayed will have an opportunity to make a personal entry in the Project Diary, where these comments will form part of the Project record. The eight photographers will be available at different times through Project Days 2 through 5 at Project HQ to chat with the public, discuss their work, and generally explain how and why the artist has captured a particular Sault scene or landmark. We envisage a powerful, interactive, and highly informative / educational experience for all Project HQ visitors.

The Project is a 100% volunteer-driven, community centred endeavour. None of the AWC leaders identified above (nor any other AWC members involved in the Project ) will directly or indirectly receive any Project funds. The Project budget exceeds the ACAP allowable maximum for unincorporated association projects (\$2,999), but the AWC leadership is confident that within the 7 month Project timeline, (November 1, 2024 to mid-May, 2025), the AWC will secure sufficient additional sponsorship or other funding to satisfy all budget / operational / delivery needs.

As importantly, the Project is entirely aligned with the City's Community Culture Plan 2019 - 2024 and ACAP Guidelines. The following ACAP priorities are especially highlighted in this respect: (1) the Project directly contributes to the development of Sault arts, culture and heritage; (2) it will correspondingly boost the Sault's literary and broader creative community profile; (3) professional development opportunities are provided for emerging and professional writers and photographers; (4) the Project fosters community connections, partnerships and networks through its resolutely public, participatory, no cost, and inclusive nature; (5) significant volunteerism opportunities will be created; and (6), 'Fresh Eyes' will directly contribute to overall Sault quality of life and our sense of identity - this Project tells the Sault story from multiple visual and written perspectives.

The Project clearly satisfies all Project Grant requirements (as the comments provided above additionally reinforce). The AWC emphasises a particular Project Grant requirement in this context: fostering community pride through the creation and appreciation of artistic works. This Project is unique. It will have a tangible outcome as the 'Fresh Eyes' publication that will be available everywhere (Physical and e-book formats). The Project also has a powerful intangible element — a boost to Sault Ste Marie pride and civic engagement that is encouraged by the Project structure and its full public access.

In addition to the Project features highlighted above, the Project will also generate the following valuable residual benefits. These are listed in a non-hierarchical order:

1. The Project is submitted as a 'one time' event consistent with ACAP guidelines. However, the AWC sees

In addition to the Project's valuable residual benefits outlined in section (vi), individual Project HQ visitors (the immediate Project 'audience'), Project participants, and the Sault community will derive the following Project benefits:

- 1. Audience free of charge, anyone in the Sault community (residents, students (elementary, secndary, and post-secondary), community groups (e.g. Senior's outings), and Sault visitors can directly engage with Project writers and photographers at Project HQ over a four day period a unique opportunity to learn, and experience first hand how the creative process unfolds. It is believed that 'Fresh Eyes' is a Canadian creative community 'first'.
- 2. Participants a unique opportunity to work on a Sault creative project with high level fellow creative talents / collaborators. These individuals will also have an ownership stake in the finished published work, with obvious related opportunities for creative community networking, promoting their own work, and reputational advancement.
- 3. Community Our community will literally see a unique Sault story take shape before its eyes over a focused, 100% acessible five day period. Eight photographers and eight writers' creative output will be augmented by all community comments provided in the Project Diary that will be maintained / overseen by the AWC throughout the Project period. The 'Fresh Eyes' publication will give the community tangible proof of how the creative process works. It is anticipated that the entire Sault community will have renewed pride in our City knowing that 'Fresh Eyes' has been taken to its successful conclusion.

Local Sault and regional audiences are a primary Project target. The AWC believes that our unique Project and its free public access / public interaction with the creative process will be popular with Sault residents and groups (as identified in section (vii) above. Given the Project nature and objectives, this audience is likely our most important one.

The regional Algoma community is an important secondary audience. The Sault is our regional hub, and the Project will likely generate significant regional interest.

Tourism is another important secondary audience. The AWG believes that with a seven month lead period, visitors with an interest in creative works, literary projects, and the arts / culture generally will potentially be motivated to visit the Sault and take in a unique creative experience.

The Algoma Writers' Collective (AWC) is an unincorporated Sault Ste Marie, Ontario based association committed to the advancement, promotion, and encouragement of the literary arts in our city and surrounding region.

The AWC leadership group is comprised of the four following volunteer members. All of us reside and work in the Sault or nearby communities. We are a resolutely flexible, inclusive collective devoted to promoting the Sault and broader Algoma literary community. Our new AWC website will be 'live' on or about November 5, 2024. We are each seasoned creative world professionals who are also experienced project managers (including budget management and achieving defined project milestones).

**Judy Penz Sheluk** (Sault Ste Marie; Goulais River) A former journalist and news editor, Judy is a multiple Canadian and North American award winning author and independent publisher (<u>Superior Shores Press</u>). 	Loop Sessions SSM is a series of events organized by DJ Seith and Konaphan, occurring every three months and are community-building events that offer young artists and producers the space to come together and participate in a group beat making session and music showcase. The way they work is: At the beginning of the event, a DJ is set up in one corner of the space with a station set up for sampling records. Producers come in and connect with the DJ to obtain snippets of sound from the selected records, and then set up small workstations of their own in the space to spend the next 5 hours working with the sound clips to create an original composition. All participating artists will be working using headphones to minimize spatial disruption while they create. At the end of the session, everyone gets together and shares their work in the space over the speaker. Following the session, all of the submissions get collected and shared online as a playlist.
	These events are designed to happen in spaces as business operates with little interruption as they occur, with a typically small number of people participating in the event itself. The goal in hosting these beat making sessions is to provide an outlet for youth to create, share, and connect with one-another. The participants these events will support will primarily be an intersection of beat makers of varying skill levels, indigenous urban youth (16-35) and allies.

The Loop Sessions SSM beat making sessions are a crucial and important effort to uplift and support the beat making community that has been growing in urban indigenous youth and ally populations in Algoma District, a cadre of young creatives who often face social and financial barriers that prohibit their inclusion in arts programming in the larger arts community. The community-focused nature of the events allow for novice and seasoned beat makers of all skill levels to get together and share, create, exchange knowledge, and provide mentorship opportunities to youth who attend, while establishing beat making as a valid and globally-recognized artform in Algoma District. The core team for Loop Sessions SSM is DJ Seith and Konaphan, and Seith is mentoring Konaphan during our first year of operations. We have connected with Home Bakehouse and Cafe to house the events, and we work with other local artists for poster and promotional material design (our first event, happening on November 14th 2024, features poster design by local artist Aaron Alessandrini). The showcase portion of each event is meant to allow for the participants to show their work to their peers, and give and receive supportive feedback on their creations, a critical component to professional development. Having a regularly-occurring Loop Sessions event allows for a stronger sense of identity in those who participate, and also provides another avenue for the arts in our community, improving quality of life.

vii. What are the benefits to audiences, participants, and/or the community of Sault Ste. Marie that are intended upon successful completion and implementation of this activity, project or event? (maximum 500 words):

The Loop Sessions SSM beat making sessions provide an important place for producers and beat makers to connect and strengthen bonds with one-another. Upon completion of the events, the City of Sault Ste. Marie will see a better-connected beat making scene that will thrive as an important aspect of the arts landscape in the north, while providing a space for urban youth that often experience the narrative that there is no support for beat making and producing in small communities. The sessions will also act as a hub where music learning will happen organically for participants through knowledge sharing.

The Loop Sessions SSM's success will be measured in terms of how well it is able to hold space for beat makers and producers to gather and create together. We have taken many steps to ensure that the space we chose fit the technical requirements for the events. Things like access to multiple outlets, good acoustics, adequate seating and plenty of table space for producers to set up on were taken into account. We have also put care and time into ensuring that we will be properly set up to facilitate sample distribution among participants, using audio sampling equipment on our end which will work with a variety of interfaces that participants will bring in, as well as a dedicated sample station manager that will be on-hand to help. As we complete sessions, we will be speaking with participants to get direct feedback about how we can better improve our practices, with the intent of building better capacity for providing good support to the scene.

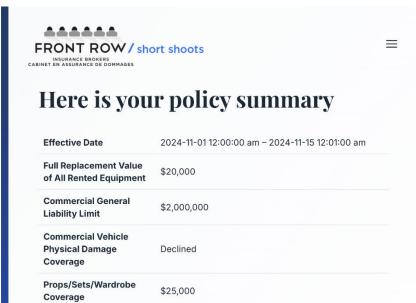

The tragedy is that this creature, however terrifying, offered warmth and connection to a young, vulnerable Matthew when nobody else was there for him - when he needed a friend the most. Little did the boy know, stumbling upon the entity in the stretch of woods behind his childhood would change his life forever.

For the first time - he felt seen. Matthew hated the hideous thing, feared its evil deeds, but still, it's presence was alluring. So dangerous in nature, and yet it allowed the curious boy to grow close. Matthew finally had a friend. The only problem was, it was damn hungry. And Matthew held the keys to a whole new hunting ground.

It was just small animals at first; birds, rats. Then the squirrels, the raccoons. He would come home drenched in sweat, digging holes for the corpses the creature left scattered around the yard in the early mornings.

One day, the creature decided it wanted to eat their family cat. Of course Matthew knew his parents would find out if he helped his friend, but he couldn't bear to lose it. So he made it happen.

His mother confronted him - he claimed he had "let the cat out to explore" . . . but she knew better. Something was wrong with the boy. So his parents carted him off to specialists. Barred him from leaving the house unattended.

But this angered the creature.

Every night the creature tapped on his window, begging Matthew to come out and play. "But I'm not allowed" he would say. "Then let me inside," the creature would respond, "I'm so very hungry."

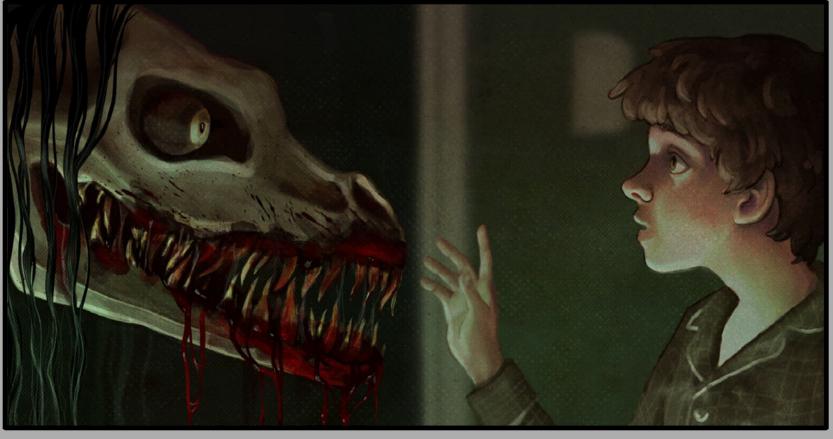

SHUFF. Two bright reflective orbs appear in the darkness, boring down into Matthew from almost the height of the ceiling.

Mo--

He stands there paralyzed. THUNDER rumbles through the house.

CREEAAAAKKKK-CLICK. Matthew watches, unable to move, as the orbs start to DESCEND.

MATTHEW (V.O.)

There was another feeling, harder to place, but it was there.

Matthew is shaking in terror.

CLICK. CLICK. CREAAAAAK. The orbs draw nearer.

YOUNG MATTHEW

M-M--

Matthew's breathing starts to slow as he stares at the scene. His face starts to change. He calms down. His eyes droop -- and he COLLAPSES.

MATTHEW (V.O.)

It tugged at me, told me to stay.

INT. MATTHEW'S DINING ROOM - DAY (PRESENT)

Matthew rings his hands, feeling the arthritis in his old bones catching up, the cold-front of the fall season starting to eat him alive already.

MATTHEW

You see, I had somehow formed a connection with this creature. But how can you find comfort in something you can barely stand to look at?

Sylvia is back to ignoring her grandfather, happily brushing one of her dolls' hair with a tiny brush.

She, written by Sarah Skagen, is a play that confronts the complex impacts of Intimate Partner Violence (IPV) through a collection of intertwined narratives based on real-life experiences. The work is grounded in the voices and stories of women who have survived IPV, examining the enduring effects it has on their mental health, relationships, and sense of self. The goal of She is to shed light on the invisible scars left by such trauma, challenging the audience to understand how IPV affects individuals and the communities around them. Skagen emphasizes that the performance serves not only as a vehicle for awareness but also as an invitation to support survivors and deepen empathy toward those affected by IPV.

The play's goals are multifaceted. First, it aims to foster awareness of the lasting and often unseen impacts of IPV, moving beyond immediate physical harm to highlight its emotional and psychological toll. Additionally, She seeks to dismantle stigma surrounding survivors, empowering them by giving voice to their experiences. Another key goal is to create a shared understanding and cultivate a collective responsibility to address IPV openly, while encouraging audiences to consider how they can support survivors in their own lives. The first and only run of this play sold out within 24 hours and left a large number of people, including many our Zonta members, unable to attend.

She raises crucial awareness of the topic of gender-based violence in its many forms. Zonta envisions a world where no woman lives in fear of violence. Violence against women and girls is one of the most pervasive human rights violations and a global epidemic. It knows no national or cultural barriers; it takes place at home, in the workplace and in open spaces and affects millions of women and girls in peacetime and conflict.

Intimate partner violence is one of the most common forms of violence against women and includes physical, sexual, and emotional abuse, as well as controlling behaviour by an intimate partner. According to the World Health Organization and the United Nation's Office On Drugs and Crime, 30% of women worldwide who have been in a relationship report that they have experienced some form of physical and/or sexual violence by their intimate partner. Sadly, most of these women do not seek aid and the cycle of violence continues. Provincially, over 1020 women and children lost their lives in the province of Ontario due to men's violence since 1990, according to statistics from the Ontario Association of Interval & Transition Houses. Closer to home, 987 intimate partner crimes were reported from January 1 – August 31, 2024 in Sault Ste. Marie according to the Sault Ste. Marie Police statistical report.

Each November, Zonta Clubs take part in the global Zonta Says NO to Violence Against Women Campaign. The Zonta Club of Sault Ste. Marie Area brings attention to this issue with an annual display of orange shoes representing the women and children who were victims of femicide in Ontario in one year. This year's display will be at the Northern Community Centre from November 25 – December 10 and will consist of 62 pairs of shoes. 5 of these 62 will represent women and children from Sault Ste. Marie. The play *She* depicts the story of one of these women.

Your support with bringing the play *She* to a larger audience will help to raise crucial awareness of the issue of gender-based violence and give hope to those who have and who are currently experiencing it.

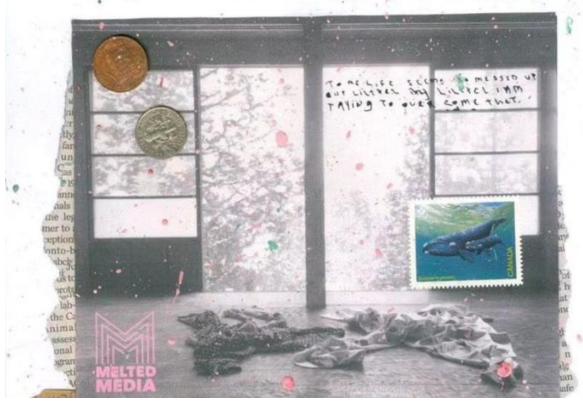

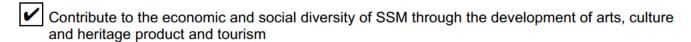

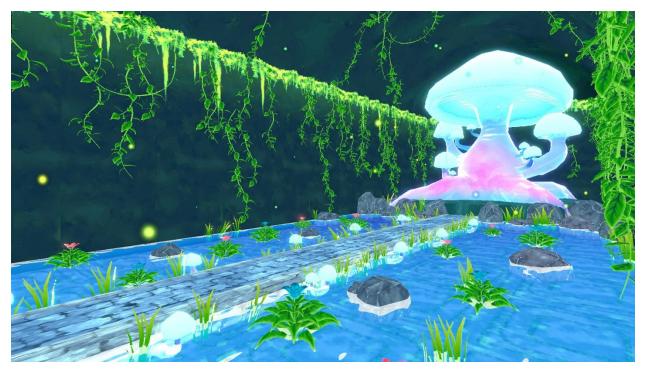

When the Sault Blues Society presents our award-winning blues shows, we expose the citizens of Sault Ste. Marie to some of the highest quality Canadian and International Blues acts while broadening their musical genres. Our five annual Bon Soo presentations alone have accounted for 1243 ticket sales, with many of our patrons gathering for dinners prior to or during the shows benefiting the local eateries. While organizing our shows we are in regular contact with the musicians, local sound, lighting, printing companies, and music venues to plan and finalize our featured and local musicians. While doing this there is constant communication between the traveling musicians and local musicians and sound/lighting companies and volunteers. We have utilized local musicians on all occasions as the opening acts for our headliners and on several occasions, we have supplied our local talented musicians as backing, rhythm section and fill in musicians as required. The amount of community connections and networking that happens during and after our presentations is quite impressive to observe. We enlist up to 8 volunteers for every show that we present for poster distribution, staffing the ticket table at the door, the Sault Blues Society membership table in conjunction with the artists merchandise table where we sell their CD's, swag and wearables allowing the artists to put all their effort and energy into their finest performances. We have also organized several master musical workshops, including voice, harmonica and guitar while our award-winning headliners were in the Soo.

vii. What are the benefits to audiences, participants, and/or the community of Sault Ste. Marie that are intended upon successful completion and implementation of this activity, project or event? (500 words maximum):

The Sault Blues Society has presented many of Canada's best award-winning blues musicians and have received much positive feedback from both the artists as well as the audiences. The fact that we continue to present award winning blues acts after 14 years and over 57 shows that we are in this for the long haul. Every year the SBS hires 30 to 40 local blues musicians to play at various events and expose hundreds of people to blues music for their dancing and musical enjoyment. We have always used local sound and lighting production companies and local printers for all posters and tickets for our presentations. We also use local music related stores to sell tickets for our presentations which draws patrons to these stores. We secure ground transportation, motel/hotel accommodations and meals for travelling artists. A significant number of the audience come from surrounding areas to attend our shows contributing to the local economy. There is a financial benefit to the musicians, sound production crew, local venue, our local ticket selling outlets. Receiving this Cultural grant from the city affords us the opportunity to continue to offer community based and fundraising ventures that are not ticketed.

Successful implementation is judged by audience and performers participation. With most costs, through ticket sales we continue to secure successful award-winning acts for future presentations. This is measured by the attendance at performances with feedback from the audiences, performers as well as venue owners, sound and lighting production staff.

This is shown by the fact that the Sault Blues Society has been invited back to participate at the Bon Soo carnival for the past six years. We have also been invited back for our 4th time by Rotary to present our annual Friday Night Blues as part of Rotaryfest 2025. The fact that Sault Blaster has invited us once again to present 2 nights of Blues for Food and the 3rd night with the SSM chamber of commerce shows our combined dedication and successful implementation in support of local charities. We are also coordinating efforts with The Tap Room and Angry Joe's BBQ to present our 3rd annual Blues Brews & BBQ on Nov. 9th.

Merchandise sales for artists, SBS merchandise and memberships helps indicate support for our presentations and choice of bands that we present. Our success can also be measured by comparing the final concert summary to previous concert summaries where we can find any cost saving or performance enhancing measures.

Soo Blaster gives us a 40% discount on food items purchased for the bands during the night of the shows which saves us quite a bit on meals and hospitality for the bands.

We have tried to keep our ticket prices as low as possible to ensure community is able to attend with the understanding of hardships that impact the 2SLGBTQ+ community and our desire to ensure community spaces and events are available for the queer community. We would like to ensure adequate funding to pay performers; bring in out of town headliners to help promote the show to larger

# Haus of Gore

Drag Collective, Sault Ste. Marie, ON/MI



Summary

The Haus of Gore is a drag collective that traditionally spans the international border in Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario and Michigan. The Haus was named after one of its founding members, Paris Gore. Currently headed by Paris and Luke McAnally-Gore-Shadow, the Haus of Gore has been brining drag events to Sault Ste. Marie since 2017.

Featured Annual Shows *Drag Me To Hell* – The inaugural Haus of Gore production in October 2017. This show was developed to showcase up and coming drag artists by providing a venue for them to bring Glam, Filth, and Horror themed numbers to the stage

Scarlet Affair – HIV stigma reduction and awareness holds a special place in the heart of the Haus of Gore. Every February we hold a fundraising show to end the stigma and raise some funding for a local HIV program or community member impacted by HIV.

Zims Bar Sault MI 2018-2020 Haus of Gore performers volunteered to perform at Zims Bar in Sault Michigan monthly prior to COVID-19. These volunteer efforts worked to create safer spaces for queer folks to connect and relax.

Fringe North Sault ON 2021-2024 Haus of Gore has brought family and adult entertainment to audiences as part of the Fringe North festival. Their family Drag Does Disney event has included Disney lipsyncs (2023) and a musical story time adaptation of The Little Mermaid (2024).

Pride Festivities

Members of the Haus of Gore have worked with many organizations in the Sault including The Klub and Sault Pride and to bring Pride festivities to the local 2SLGBTQ+ community

Story Times

Luke McAnally-Gore-Shadow, Head of Haus, has worked with public libraries in Sault Ste Marie and Wawa to bring drag story time events to 2SLGBTQ+ families and children. Various queens from the Haus have participated in these events with Luke.

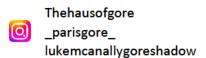

This Black History Month project aims to celebrate and amplify the voices of Black Queer individuals and other racialized communities in Sault Ste. Marie through a series of four key cultural events. By fostering understanding and inclusivity, this project will create spaces for queer people of colour to share their stories, art, and experiences. Allies will be encouraged to attend and participate, allowing the broader community to engage, learn, and support these voices. The KLUB will partner with the African Caribbean Canadian Association of Northern Ontario (ACCANO), La Casa, and other local cultural grassroots groups, nonprofits, and community organizations to ensure a rich and intersectional representation of queer experiences, fostering collaboration across diverse communities in Sault Ste. Marie.

This project idea was born after The KLUB attended ACCANO's BBQ this summer, where we began dreaming about ways to amplify queer voices in our city. Caio, a Queer Black advocate from Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, has been in Canada since 2010. They are The KLUB'S Chair and are dedicated to social justice for Black, Indigenous, People Living with HIV/AIDS, and 2SLGBTQIA+ communities. Caio shared their personal challenges in Sault Ste. Marie in feeling safe due to their intersecting identities, leading to meaningful conversations with ACCANO about partnership opportunities.

Additionally, The KLUB has formed meaningful relationships with Luis Moreno and La Casa, and we're excited to partner with them. We also have long-standing connections with local Indigenous organizations and recently formed an Indigi-Queer Youth Group, which will be included in the project. Our relationships with newcomers and the organizations that support them will also be integral to ensuring broad representation in this initiative. The more queer people of colour we meet in the community, the more we hear the same struggle to find spaces where they feel safe and celebrated.

The Algoma Conservatory has an extensive number of projects each season. These are primarily a large series of concerts, many also with recordings, as well as extensive music education programs for the community with a core of 17 professional instructors. While the individual concerts vary from season to season - the basic range and level of activity, and the number of people benefiting from the programs, is consistent year to year - with growth now projected as we expand in our new facility. Because of this it would seem clearer to consider an annual operating grant, rather than looking at every concert and education program as a separate activity. Our scale and range of activity is far larger than other music organizations in the region.

The Algoma Conservatory of Music has just completed the purchase of the heritage building at 75 Huron street and the development of a distincitive new performing arts and recording venue - THE LOFT. To: Cultural Financial Assistance Coordinator:

With an annual budget of over 1.1 million – the Algoma Conservatory of Music has an extensive number of projects each season. These are primarily a large series of concerts, many also with recordings, as well as extensive music education programs for the community with a core of 17 professional instructors.

While the individual concerts vary from season to season - the basic range and level of activity, and the number of people benefiting from the programs, is fairly consistent year to year - with growth now projected as we move away from Covid - and expand in our new facility.

Because of this we have selected the annual operating grant category – as we did last year – rather than looking at every concert and education program as a separate activity, or group of activities. Our scale and range of activity is far larger than other music organizations in the region. Based on this I feel that our request for \$22,000 is modest and reflects the limited funds that you have available.

The Algoma Conservatory purchased the heritage building at 75 Huron street and developed a distinctive new performing arts and recording venue - THE LOFT. This was a \$3,000,000 renovation project with the assistance of Canadian Heritage, FedNor, NOHFC and many generous contributors. This now establishes an outstanding regional music education, performance and recording centre - something quite unique and exceptional for a community of our size.

We are now expanding all programming. This season will feature more than 30 concerts, including classical, jazz, singer/songwriters and world music. The outstanding acoustics and professional audio and video capabilities of The Loft and the adjoining recording studio are making this a hub for regional and local artists, as well as for touring artists coming to perform and record. We also offer a variety of workshops with the touring artists each season.

We are also now expanding our music education programs with additional instructors and programs. There are several hundred music students that come for lessons every week. They include group introductory classes for young children, youth orchestras and choirs, and private lessons on all instruments and voice. There are 19 teaching studios and classrooms that are utilized for these programs. In addition, through an annual lease arrangement, Algoma University utilizes this exceptional music facility for Algoma University Music Department classes - and they plan to develop new programs utilizing The Loft recording studio. While Algoma Conservatory is affiliated with Algoma University, the Conservatory is a fully separate non-profit, charitable organization - with its own Board of Directors.

#### **Supporting Documentation – Past Projects**

The Algoma Conservatory of Music was founded in 1971 and has been in uninterrupted operation since then. Algoma Conservatory Concerts is now in its  $32^{nd}$  season – and with the completion of THE LOFT, has expanded from a series of 7 classical concerts each season with Canadian and international touring artists – to a mixed-genre series with over 30 events.

The Conservatory has a core of 17 professional instructors, offering instruction on all instruments and voice to hundreds of students. In addition there are several levels of introductory group music classes for young children and several youth ensembles including a youth orchestra and choir. A growing number of adults and senior are also now taking music lessons.

As we move out of Covid our concert series is expanding as are the music programs – to meet the capacity of our new facility at 75 Huron.

#### **INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT**

February 22, 2024

To the Board of Directors of Algoma Conservatory of Music

#### **Qualified Opinion**

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of Algoma Conservatory of Music which comprise the statement of financial position as at July 31, 2023 and statements of operations and changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In my opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the *Basis for Qualified Opinion* section of my report, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Organization as at July 31, 2023 and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

#### **Basis of Qualification**

In common with many charitable organizations, Algoma Conservatory of Music derives revenue from donations, admissions, fundraising and food and beverage, the completeness of which is not susceptible of satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, my verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Organization. Therefore, I was not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to revenues and excess of revenues over expenditures, and cash flows for the years ended July 31, 2023 and 2022 and assets and net assets as at July 31, 2023 and 2022.

I conducted my audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of Financial Statements* section of my report. I am independent of the Organization in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to my audit of the financial statements, and I have fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my qualified opinion.

#### Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Organization's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters relating to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the organization or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the organization's financial reporting process.

#### Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

My objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that
  are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the
  effectiveness of the Organization's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Organization's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Organization to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the
  disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a
  manner that achieves fair presentation.

I communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during my audit.

### ALGOMA CONSERVATORY OF MUSIC NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### YEAR ENDED JULY 31, 2023

The Algoma Conservatory of Music (the "Organization") provides an educational resource for the community by supporting and maintaining a core of highly qualified teachers and performers and a facility for instruction, masterclasses, festivals, concerts and examinations. The Organization is a registered charity and exempt from income taxes under the Income Tax Act of Canada.

#### 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### **Basis of Accounting**

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and include the following significant accounting policies:

#### **Revenue Recognition**

The Organization follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions.

Operating revenue, including unrestricted contributions, are recognized as revenue in the period when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the specific related approved expenditures are incurred.

Restricted contributions related to the purchase of capital assets are deferred and recognized as revenue on the same basis as the amortization expense related to the acquired capital assets.

#### **Cash**

Cash and cash equivalents consist of cash on hand and bank balances.

#### **Financial Instruments**

The Organization initially measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value and subsequently measures all its financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost.

Financial assets measured at amortized cost include cash and receivables.

Financial liabilities measured at amortized cost include bank indebtedness, accounts payable and accrued liabilities, and long-term debt.

#### Impairment of Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment are tested for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that their carrying value may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognized when their carrying value exceeds the total undiscounted cash flows expected from their use and eventual disposition. The amount of the impairment loss is determined as the excess carrying value of the asset over its fair value.

#### **Property, Plant and Equipment**

Land and building are recorded at cost. Equipment and musical instruments are recorded based on the estimated net realizable as at January 1, 2013.

Amortization of equipment is recorded annually at a rate of 20% on the straight-line basis.

Amortization of musical instruments is recorded annually based on any decrease in the carrying value as determined by management.

Amortization of the building is recorded annually on a straight-line basis over 50 years. No amortization was taken on construction in progress.

#### 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

#### **Use of Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from management's best estimates as additional information becomes available in the future. Significant areas requiring the use of estimates relate to the assessment of impairment of long-lived assets such as capital assets and the useful lives of assets for amortization.

#### **Contributed Materials**

The Organization recognizes contributions of used instruments when the fair market value can be reasonably estimated. When a fair market value cannot be reasonable estimated, the contribution is recorded at a nominal amount. Contributed pianos are used in the Organization's operations or for eventual sale.

#### 8. FINANCIAL RISKS

#### a) Credit risk

Credit risk arises principally from the Organization's accounts receivable. The Organization is exposed to credit risk resulting from the possibility that one party to a financial instrument will cause a financial loss for the other party by failing to discharge an obligation.

#### b) Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk arises from the Organization's credit facility. It is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. The Organization's credit facility has a variable interest rate. Changes in the bank's prime lending rate can cause fluctuations in interest payments and cash flows. The Organization does not use derivative financial instruments to alter the effect of this risk. The Organization managed this risk in 2021 by re-financing long-term debt with a BDC loan with fixed interest for 15 years.

#### c) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that an entity will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The Organization is exposed to this risk mainly in respect of its accounts payable, bank indebtedness and long-term debt payment requirements.

We've found that, with the availability of our in-person and hybrid programs and operations, folks from far and wide - in the city of Sault Ste. Marie, across the Algoma District, as well as throughout the Northern Ontario region and elsewhere in Ontario - have been joining our free, accessible participatory art-making programming and seeking ways to volunteer and support our operations from a distance, via internships and remote working opportunities. 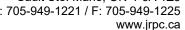

When I read the annual report, if I conclude that there is a material misstatement therein. I am required to communicate the matter to those charged with governance.

#### Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Entity's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters relating to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Entity or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Entity's financial reporting process.

#### Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

My objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures
  that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the
  effectiveness of the Entity's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Entity's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Entity to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

I communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during my audit.

### YEAR ENDED SEPTEMBER 30, 2023

Thinking Rock Community Projects Inc. is incorporated under the laws of Ontario as a non-profit corporation without share capital. As such, it is exempt from income taxes under section 149 (1) of the Income Tax Act. The financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNPO).

The mandate of Thinking Rock Community Projects Inc. is to provide services and administer projects to support the arts.

### 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

- a) Revenue recognition: Thinking Rock Community Projects Inc. follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount can be reasonably estimated and collections is reasonably assured. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Services and consulting fees are recognized when the service has been performed.
- b) Contributed goods and services: The organization has elected to recognize contributed goods and services at fair market value. The contributed goods and services would need to be purchased because they are within the normal course of operations, therefore fair market value is being determined on this basis and contributed services are recognized in the financial statements.
- c) Capital assets: Assets purchased are expensed in the year they are acquired. During the year \$2,169 (2022 \$1,231) of capital asset purchases were expensed.
- d) Financial instruments: The organization's financial instruments comprise of cash, accounts receivable and accounts payables. Financial assets or liabilities obtained in arm's length transactions are initially measured at their fair value and financial assets or liabilities obtained in related party transactions are measured at their exchange amount. The organization subsequently measures all of its financial assets and liabilities at amortized cost.

### 2. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The organization's financial instruments consist of cash, accounts receivable, and accounts payable and accrued liabilities. Unless otherwise noted, it is management's opinion that the organization is not exposed to significant interest, currency or credit risk arising from these financial instruments. The fair value of these financial instruments approximate their carrying values, unless otherwise noted.

### 3. ECONOMIC DEPENDENCE

The organization was primarily funded by municipal, provincial and federal grants which provides a significant portion of revenue used for operations. In 2023, 95% (2022 - 80%) of total revenues were from government funding.

### 4. DEFERRED CONTRIBUTIONS

Deferred contributions represent restricted contributions from funders for specific programs and projects with which the organization has not incurred any expenditures. The deferred contributions balance as at September 30 is as follows:

### 5. OPERATING RESERVE

The organization has established an internally restricted operating reserve which has been set aside for working capital purposes. The reserve has decreased during the year by \$16,695 (2022 - decreased by \$2,599) which will contribute to future working capital requirements.

### 6. CAPITAL MANAGEMENT

The organization considers its capital to be its net assets and internally restricted reserve which consist of amounts for future operations. The organization's objectives when managing its capital are to safeguard its ability to continue as a going concern so it can continue to fulfil its mandate. An annual budget is developed and monitored to ensure the organization's capital is maintained to meet these objectives.

### 7. COMMITMENTS

The organization leased a premises for a 12 month term commencing October 1, 2022. Monthly rent is required in the amount of \$1,350, plus HST. The organization is also responsible for its proportionate share of additional rent including insurance, taxes, maintenance and operating costs of the premises.

### 8. CONTRIBUTED GOODS AND SERVICES

During the year, Thinking Rock Community Projects Inc. received the following goods and services which if not donated would have been purchased. Event services staff members amounting to \$650 (2022 - \$7,000), production goods and services amounting to \$3,980 (2022 - \$3,780), and travel and accommodation amounting to Nil (2022 - \$2,250). These services are recorded as revenues and expenditures in the Statement of Operations.

### 10. FINANCIAL RISKS

### (a) Credit risk:

Credit risk refers to the risk that a counterparty may default on its contractual obligations resulting in a financial loss. The organization deals with creditworthy counterparties to mitigate the risk of financial loss from defaults. The organization performs continuous evaluation of its accounts receivable and records an allowance for impairment. No individual account is significant to the organization.

### (b) Liquidity risk:

Liquidity risk is the risk that the organization will be unable to fulfill its obligations on a timely basis or at a reasonable cost. The organization manages its liquidity risk by monitoring its operating requirements. The organization prepares budget and cash forecasts to ensure it has sufficient funds to fulfill its obligations. There has been no change to the risk exposures from 2022.

### Concentration of risk:

### (a) Industry:

The organization operates as an art association and is affected by general economic trends. The organization relies primarily on funding. Its ability to continue as a going concern depends on its ongoing ability to obtain funding through private and government sources.

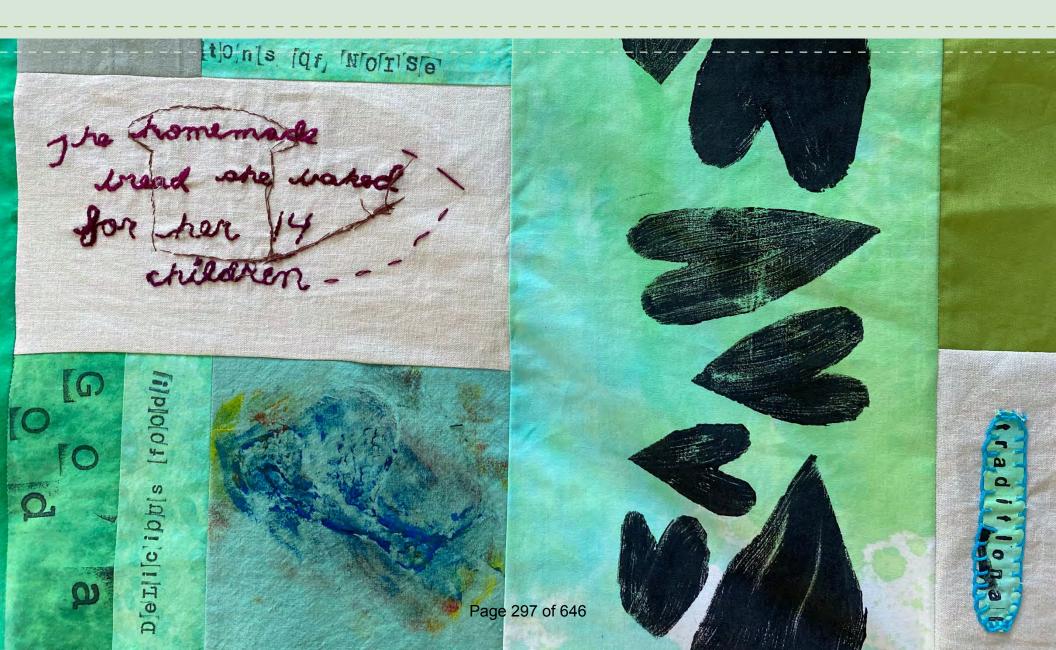

# ABOUT THE LANDS WHERE WE WORK

The Thinking Rockers live, gather, work, and create across the North Shore region in Robinson-Huron Treaty Territory, on the lands of the Anishinaabek of Baawating (including Ketegaunseebee/Garden River First Nation and Batchewana First Nation); and at Payentanassin (St. Joseph Island), Neyaashiwan (Thessalon First Nation), Misswezhaging (Mississauga First Nation) and Genaabaajing (Serpent River First Nation). The Métis have lived for generations in this region, which is home today to folks of diverse Indigenous Nations from across Turtle Island and the world. Land acknowledgments recognize the relationships between Indigenous Peoples and their territories that have existed since time immemorial. They also acknowledge our relational responsibility, as inhabitants of these territories, to people and the planet. To us, this looks like embracing ongoing learning, and taking informed, heart-led actions in support of reparation relationships and reconciliation in the work we do, everyday.

# OUR FOUNDING

Thinking Rock was established in May 2013 by Founding Artistic Director, Robin Sutherland. Gigidoowag Ziibiik | The Rivers Speak was Thinking Rock's first major multi-year project, a community play that drew inspiration from personal stories, memories, myths, tall tales and legends shared by Indigenous and Settler people of Central Algoma about local waterways. The project brought community members together across time, distance and culture to share and animate their stories through a collaborative process, guided by professional, interdisciplinary artist facilitators. Over the course of 5 years (2013-18), more than 4,000 community participants were involved in the project!



# WHO WE ARE: OUR MISSION & MANDATE

Based in Thessalon, Algoma District, Northern Ontario, we co-create art with and for the people living along the North Shore of Lake Huron, from Genaabaajing (Serpent River First Nation) to Baawaating (Sault Ste. Marie) and all points in between. We're a team of artists, cultural workers and community members of Indigenous, settler and Newcomer descent who co-create spaces for dialogue, mutual understanding and artful social change through multidisciplinary, multi-generational, cross-cultural community arts projects.

Through our free and inclusive artistic programming, we invite people of all Nations, ages, abilities, backgrounds and identities to join us in playing, making and dreaming about this special place we call home – as it was, as it is, and as it might yet be. We learn more everyday about what that invitation, the spaces we hold together, and the ways we show up for each other can and must look like, and we bring this growing understanding to our work.

# OUR THEORY OF CHANGE

We believe that if Central Algomans of Indigenous, Newcomer and settler descent cocreate community arts projects and presentations, then we'll build relationships across cultures and communities, and that opportunities to live, work and play in the arts will increase across the region. Ultimately, this will lead to more inclusive, vibrant and resilient Algoma communities.





# THE SOCIAL FABRIC PROJECT



**Social Fabric**, our current, multi-year community arts project, engages a variety of fabric, fibre and textile-based making practices – some unique and others common to Indigenous, Newcomer and settler traditions in Central Algoma. Many of these handwork practices are deeply embedded in our rural communities, handed down over generations. We're learning together about how things have been made here across time, and sparking cross-cultural, intergenerational conversations about the people, cultures, traditions and territories in this special place.

Slowing down with textile-based practice instills a reflective pace in the maker, and creates a connection with the handwork that develops and evolves over time. This echoes the weaving and interweaving of our lives and relationships to each other, which similarly require care, mindfulness, reflection, practice, and a commitment to ongoing learning. We are reflecting together on two key ideas:

**Interweaving -** The more we collaborate, the more interwoven we become. We look for and make opportunities to come together to share - about ourselves, our skills, our art-making and our time. We work together to promote and engage in meaningful, actionable social change that weaves our communities, learnings and day-to-day practices together.

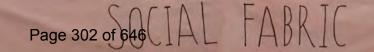
**Mending -** We are learning about repair, and looking to techniques of mending, patching and darning for inspiration: we're mending our clothes, to keep them present and useful; we're reflecting on our relationship to the environment, our knowledge of our locations on Gidakiiminaang, and mending our ways to leave a lighter, more thankful footprint; and we're learning more everyday about what it means to live in the land now known as Canada, using daily practices of reflecting, connecting and making to mend the tears between us, weave new ways, and heal - as individuals and as a community.



Local and regional artists, practitioners, knowledge- and skill-holders have been generously sharing their skills and collaborating intergenerationally and cross-culturally with community and artistic team members to weave these approaches together into new, truly community-based works. We will work closely with local Indigenous Elders and knowledge keepers to ensure that the conveyance of these skills respects, observes and upholds cultural protocols.

As Social Fabric continues, we'll weave in popular community art forms such as installation, puppet-making, music, culinary and performing arts. We'll co-create and host culminating presentations at each phase to share and celebrate what we've made together, thank participating communities, and invite folks into the process. The project will wrap up with a multidisciplinary celebration that visually and metaphorically reflects the hundreds of stories, makers and methods that informed our multi-year creative process. We'll imbue the Social Fabric we weave together with a truly Algoman relevance, reflexivity and respect.







Launched in Fall 2020, Making Nights are hybrid (online & in-person), co-hosted social spaces where we meet and share - anything from artsy techniques & tricks, to happenings from daily life, and our reflections on inspired topics and questions. Together, we hold a gentle space for brave, creative conversations that keep our hands busy and our hearts full. Making Nights in 2021-22 featured guest artist hosts (including Josie Weir and Áine Schryer-O'Gorman) and Social Fabric themes, including "Start from Somewhere", "Fresh Starts/Oshki-Maajitaang, Indooshki-Maajitaa", "Creative Flow" and "Recalculating!" Two very special Making Nights were hosted, including "Maamawi-ozhitamaadiying giganawenindimin: A Special Making Night with Anishinaabemowin," with Grandmother Marly Day and Auntie Arlene Ash; and "Circle In", designed and delivered by Betty Carpick for National Indigenous Peoples Day. We hosted Making Night #42 on September 27th!

# SOCIAL FABRIC DROP-INS



Hosted in community spaces across the North Shore, drop-ins welcome people of all ages and communities to join free collaborative community arts activities inspired by our Social Fabric project. All materials are provided - come when you can for as long as you're able, to add your voice and creativity to a radically inclusive project! In 2021-22, we happily resumed recurring, in-person drop in artmaking sessions, which had been abruptly suspended during the first COVID-19 lockdown in March 2020. Together with our partners at AlgomaTrad (Richards Landing), and the Ermatinger-Clergue National Historic site and the Northern Community Centre (Sault Ste. Marie), we held 7 regional drop-in sessions that hosted 31 unique participants and created 50 participation opportunities.



In late April and early May 2022, Artistic Director Miranda Bouchard was invited to be artist in residence with the Social Fabric Project at Jumblies Theatre + Arts, Toronto. During her two-week residency, she brought a number of existing, and workshopped new, Social Fabric activities, ideas and artworks with Jumblies' artists, including Ruth Howard, our longtime mentor and the Founding Artistic Director of Jumblies. Along with visual art and craft-based making, Social Fabric themes were woven through song, music and movement. Throughout this unforgettable two-week residency, 4 drop-in art-making sessions, one Making Night, an Artist's Talk, and a Soft Finale Event - all free -were hosted, creating 200+ participation opportunities, lasting memories, and new bridges between Northern and Southern Ontario colleagues and communities.



# SKILL-BUILDING WORKSHOPS

Free, low-stakes, hybrid (in-person & online) sessions led by local and regional makers, artists and craftspeople that support, share and celebrate creative skills. Participation from folks of all ages, Nations, backgrounds, abilities and identities is encouraged: learning with and from each other, we build connectedness, capacity, knowledge and resiliency. In 2020-21, as we resumed pre-pandemic programming plans, we hosted two separate workshop series - The Soft Skills Circle (November 2021 - February 2022) and the Hands & Lands Sessions (June - August 2022).

# THE SOFT SKILLS CIRCLE

In collaboration with several artist mentors & collaborators (including Eleanor Albanese, Michael Burtt, Elizabeth Creith, Mireille Gagnon Moes, Sharon Hamlin, Sharon Hunter, Neslihan Memiguven, Lisa Meschino and Josie Weir) to bring free skill-building workshops highlighting skills in art-making, craft and mindfulness to multi-generational participants. The Soft Skills Circle celebrated healthy aging in community, as well as several key goals of the Social Fabric Project, in artful, heartful ways. Together, we hosted 8 workshops between November and February for 52 unique participants of all ages; created 158 unique participation opportunities; and curated, packed and delivered more than 160 artmaking kits. We are grateful to the New Horizons for Seniors Program for funding the Soft Skills Circle project.





Between June and August, we delivered The Hands & Lands Sessions, a second free workshop series (featuring Dawn Moes. Tuija Mireille Gagnon Allard. Hansen. Jamie Oshkabewisens and Patricia Winter) including 5 public skillbuilding workshops cnnecting craft-based community artists with multigenerational participants to share and celebrate regional craft traditions and collaboratively create new works, while exploring and supporting key goals, themes and material concerns of the Social Fabric Project. Together, we hosted 34 unique participants of all ages; created 70 participation opportunities; and curated, packed and delivered more than 100 artmaking kits. We are grateful to the Ontario Arts

Council's Craft Projects Program for their support Page 305 of 646

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Following a limited children's programming pilot project developed and delivered in Summer 2021, we launched a year-long series of free seasonal programming - The Seasons & Senses Program - for children ages 5 to 10 in Fall 2021. Sessions focused, season-by-season, on artful activation of all five senses, and registrants were provided with curated, hand-packed art kits of materials to spark their creative curiosity. Together, with the company of guest artists, we reflected on our connections to the land, the season at hand, and each other through art-making techniques, movement activities, music and more. We are grateful to have received the support of the Canada Post Community Foundation for this program, which created 37 participation opportunities for 20 unique participants over 24 sessions.



# COMMUNITY OUTREACH



Throughout the year, the Thinking Rockers travel far and wide, hosting outreach booths that both show and tell about our work - the best way we've found to share it! Along with putting faces to the name, our tables offer organizational and project information; dates of upcoming programs; email and newsletter sign-ups; give-away items designed with community; and chances for folks to participate in current activities. We hosted outreach & mending booths at events across the region, and are thankful to our project partners and hosts, 49th Apparel (Sault Ste. Marie) and Centre Francophone Sault-Ste-Marie; the St. Joseph Island Lions Club (Hilton Beach); AlgomaTrad (Richards Landing/Desbarats); and the Town of Thessalon.



We excitedly hosted our inaugural Open House on August 20th, featuring drop-in artmaking, an exhibition of Social Fabric works created to date, and - supported by words from Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Michael Mantha - publicly acknowledged the support of the Ontario Trillium Foundation and the Government of Ontario's Community Building Fund.

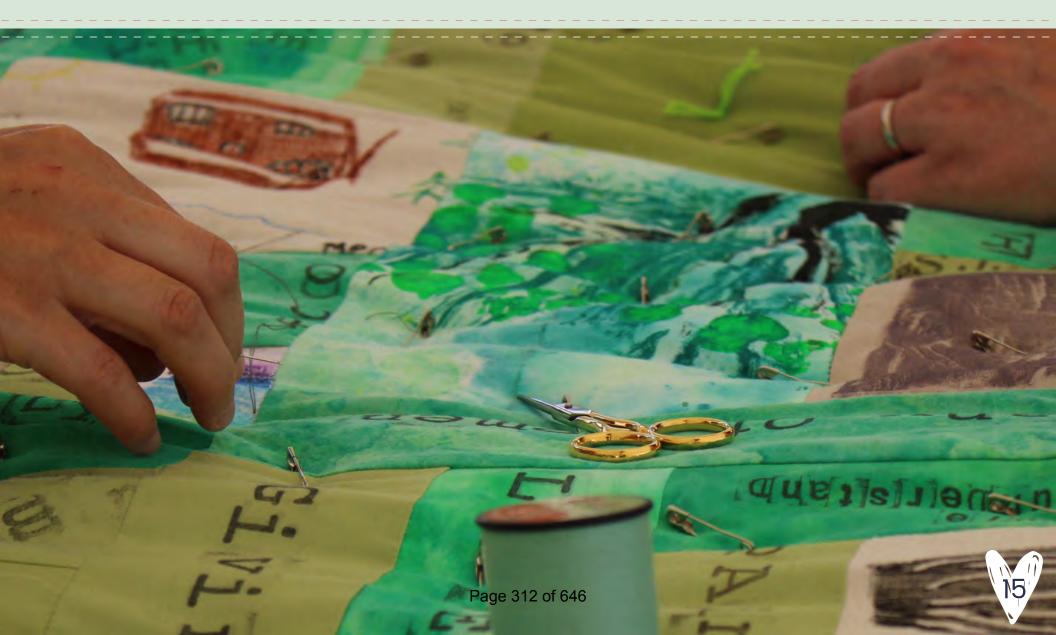

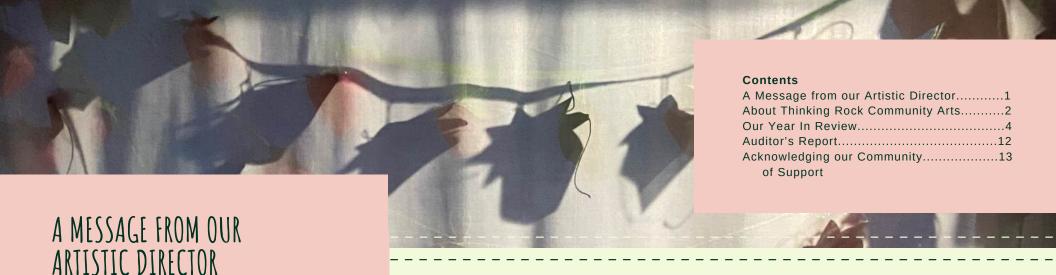

# AANII! BONJOUR! HELLO!

We continued to emerge and balance in 2022-23, thanks to the efforts of our dedicated artistic and staff team members, volunteers, community partners and participants!

Building on our pandemic learning and experiences, and supported by community feedback, we returned - in a big way! - to in-person programs, hosting all-ages Drop-Ins across Algoma and launching our new Communi-Bee program. We also continued hybrid programs, including the *A Stitch in Time* skill-building workshop series, and our beloved Making Nights.

With the assistance of two wonderful summer students, we traveled across Algoma in July and August, hosting outreach and artmaking booths to share the word about our work. We hosted two Open House events at our programming space in Thessalon, TRHQ, and welcomed visitors into an exhibition of our Social Fabric works created to date.

In partnership with NORDIK Institute, we launched *In Service of our Stories*, a community-based research project that will champion the important work by, and needs of, community-engaged artists in the North. The project aims to identify potential organizational models that a community artsfocussed arts service organization, or similar supportive entity, might take.

We shifted our strategic planning process to one of ongoing strategic accountability, working to ensure that justice, equity, diversity and inclusion are embedded in everything we do; we nurtured connections and sought new ways to connect with partners and participants; and we implemented our new ONCA-aligned bylaws.

# ABOUT THE LANDS WHERE WE WORK



The Thinking Rockers live, gather, work, and create across the North Shore region in Robinson-Huron Treaty Territory, on the lands of the Anishinaabek of Baawating (including Ketegaunseebee/Garden River First Nation and Batchewana First Nation); and at Payentanassin (St. Joseph Island), Neyaashiwan (Thessalon First Nation), Misswezhaging (Mississauga First Nation) and Genaabaajing (Serpent River First Nation). The Métis have lived for generations in this region, which is home today to folks of diverse Indigenous Nations from across Turtle Island and the world. Land acknowledgments recognize the relationships between Indigenous Peoples and their territories that have existed since time immemorial. They also acknowledge our relational responsibility, as inhabitants of these territories, to people and the planet. To us, this looks like embracing ongoing learning, and taking informed, heart-led actions in support of reparation relationships and reconciliation in the work we do, everyday.

# OUR FOUNDING

Thinking Rock was established in May 2013 by Founding Artistic Director, Robin Sutherland. *Gigidoowag Ziibiik* | *The Rivers Speak* was Thinking Rock's first major multi-year project, a community play that drew inspiration from personal stories, memories, myths, tall tales and legends shared by Indigenous and Settler people of Central Algoma about local waterways. The project brought community members together across time, distance and culture to share and animate their stories through a collaborative process, guided by professional, interdisciplinary artist facilitators. Over the course of 5 years (2013-18), more than 4,000 community participants were involved in the project!





# WHO WE ARE: OUR MISSION & MANDATE

Based in Thessalon, Algoma District, Northern Ontario, we co-create art with and for the people living along the North Shore of Lake Huron, from Genaabaajing (Serpent River First Nation) to Baawaating (Sault Ste. Marie) and all points in between. We're a team of artists, cultural workers and community members of Indigenous, settler and Newcomer descent who co-create spaces for dialogue, mutual understanding and artful social change through multidisciplinary, multigenerational, cross-cultural community arts projects.

Through our free and inclusive artistic programming, we invite people of all Nations, ages, abilities, backgrounds and identities to join us in playing, making and dreaming about this special place we call home – as it was, as it is, and as it might yet be. We learn more everyday about what that invitation, the spaces we hold together, and the ways we show up for each other can and must look like, and we bring this growing understanding to our work.





# OUR THEORY OF CHANGE

We believe that if Central Algomans of Indigenous, Newcomer and settler descent co-create community arts projects and presentations, then we'll build relationships across cultures and communities, and that opportunities to live, work and play in the arts will increase across the region. Ultimately, this will lead to more inclusive, vibrant and resilient Algoma communities.





**Social Fabric**, our current, multi-year community arts project, engages a variety of fabric, fibre and textile-based making practices – some unique and others common to Indigenous, Newcomer and settler traditions in Central Algoma. Many of these handwork practices are deeply embedded in our rural communities, handed down over generations. We're learning together about how things have been made here across time, and sparking cross-cultural, intergenerational conversations about the people, cultures, traditions and territories in this special place.

Slowing down with textile-based practice instills a reflective pace in the maker, and creates a connection with the handwork that develops and evolves over time. This echoes the weaving and interweaving of our lives and relationships to each other, which similarly require care, mindfulness, reflection, practice, and a commitment to ongoing learning. We are reflecting together on two key ideas:

# Interweaving

The more we collaborate, the more interwoven we become. We look for and make opportunities to come together to share - about ourselves, our skills, our art-making and our time. We work together to promote and engage in meaningful, actionable social change that weaves our communities, learnings and day-to-day practices together.

### Mending

We are learning about repair, and looking to techniques of mending, patching and darning for inspiration: we're mending our clothes, to keep them present and useful; we're reflecting on our relationship to the environment, our knowledge of our locations on Gidakiiminaang, and mending our ways to leave a lighter, more thankful footprint; and we're learning more everyday about what it means to live in the land now known as Canada, using daily practices of reflecting, connecting and making to mend the tears between us, weave new ways, and heal - as individuals and as a community.

# SOCIAL FABRIC

Local and regional artists, practitioners, knowledge- and skill-holders have been generously sharing their skills and collaborating intergenerationally and cross-culturally with community and artistic team members to weave these approaches together into new, truly community-based works. We will work closely with local Indigenous Elders and knowledge keepers to ensure that the conveyance of these skills respects, observes and upholds cultural protocols.

As Social Fabric continues, we'll weave in popular community art forms such as installation, puppet-making, music, culinary and performing arts. We'll co-create and host culminating presentations at each phase to share and celebrate what we've made together, thank participating communities, and invite folks into the process. The project will wrap up with a multidisciplinary celebration that visually and metaphorically reflects the hundreds of stories, makers and methods that informed our multi-year creative process. We'll imbue the Social Fabric we weave together with a truly Algoman relevance, reflexivity and respect.







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# MAKING NIGHTS MAKING NIGHTS

Launched in Fall 2020, Making Nights are hybrid, co-hosted social spaces where we meet and share - anything from artsy techniques and tricks, to happenings from daily life, and reflections on inspired topics and questions. Together, we hold a gentle space for brave, creative conversations that keep our hands busy and our hearts full. Our 2022-23 program reflected on Social Fabric themes, such as "Giving a Darn", "HeARTful Strength", and "Making Traditions." This year, we hosted 21 Making Nights that created 283 participation opportunities, and we celebrated Making Night #50 on January 31st!

Hosted in community spaces across the North Shore, Social Fabric Drop-Ins welcome intergenerational participants to join free, collaborative community arts activities inspired by our Social Fabric project. All materials are provided. Come when you can for as long as you're able, to add your voice and creativity to a radically inclusive project! In 2022-23, we hosted a total of 30 Social Fabric Drop-Ins in partnership with the Thessalon Public Library and the Town of Thessalon's recreation department, the Ermatinger-Clergue National Historic Site and the Northern Community Centre (Sault Ste. Marie), and Ojibway Park (Ketegaunseebee First Nation). This created 373 participation opportunities for folks across the Algoma District!

Social Fabric workshops are free, low-stakes, hybrid (in-person and online) spaces that support, share and celebrate creative skills. Participation from folks of all ages, Nations, backgrounds, abilities and identities is encouraged: learning with and from each other, we build connections, capacity, knowledge and resiliency. The *A Stitch in Time* series - featuring Elizabeth Creith, Patricia Wynter, Angie Gallop, Betty Carpick, Kimberly Pelletier, Mireille Gagnon Moes, Heather Pepper, Grandmother Marly Day & Gerard Sagassige - shared art-making, craft and mindfulness with multi-generational participants. Altogether, we hosted 10 workshops creating 184 participation opportunities! We are grateful to the New Horizons for Seniors Program for funding the Stitch in Time series.

ELDERS CIRCLES





We strive to work closely with Indigenous Elders and Knowledge Keepers to ensure that our creative community-building work respects, observes and upholds cultural protocols. This year, we hosted circles with our long-time mentors and friends, Grandmother Marly Day (Genaabaajing) and Elder Gerard Sagassige (Curve Lake/Genaabaajing), reflecting on key Social Fabric themes of interweaving and mending in relation to traditional teachings - especially the seven Grandfather teachings, working with spirit, and the notion of reconciliation. In 2022-23, we were honoured to host a circle each with Marly and Gerard.

Inspired by working bees of old, Communi-Bee sessions call together folks of all ages, nations, identities, backgrounds and abilities to join us in caring for and completing community-created Social Fabric works-in-process. The stories that emerge around our working table nurture connectedness and creativity that truly craft community and celebrate the magic of collaborative work. We launched Communi-Bees in June 2023, hosting three sessions over the summer and fall, and fostering 82 participation opportunities

Since moving into the storefront space at 199 Main Street, Thessalon in 2021, we've hosted a number of programs and worked to transform it into a multi-purpose creative studio, gathering and working space. In 2022-23, we also hosted two public Open House events, one coinciding with Thessalon Community Days (complete with a lemonade stand!) and the second marking our year-end exhibition and staff evaluation. It feels wonderful to welcome folks in, share what we've been making together, host meaningful conversations about community, and invite more participation.

OUTREACH



Throughout the year, the Thinking Rockers travel far and wide, hosting outreach booths that both show and tell about our work - the best way we've found to share it! Along with putting faces to the name, our tables offer organizational and project information; dates of upcoming programs; email and newsletter sign-ups; give-away items designed with the community; and chances for folks to participate in current activities.

One of our favourite outreach booths of Summer 2023, in Blind River, connected us with friends both new and well-known, who shared some of their pandemic experiences along with their dreams for community mending. Some folks added to our Gathering Quilt, and offered insight we'll carry as the Social Fabric project moves onwards. We treasure these opportunities for connective conversations, and encourage you to visit our table when you see us out and about!





In Service of our Stories is a continuation of the work begun between 2018-20 through The Story of our Stories (SOOS) Regional Community-Engaged Research Project, which brought together 30 community-engaged artists from across Northern Ontario to surface the challenges and opportunities they faced in their vital work, and better understand the support, research and policy that might help to make the work easier and more sustainable.

Working in partnership, Thinking Rock Community Arts and NORDIK Institute will research and identify, through a literature review and stakeholder consultations, what a potential organizational model might be for a Northern, community engaged arts-focussed Arts Service Organization (ASO) or similar body.

They have travelled and sung all along the North Shore and have been requested to sing at various functions like conferences, graduations, and other gatherings.

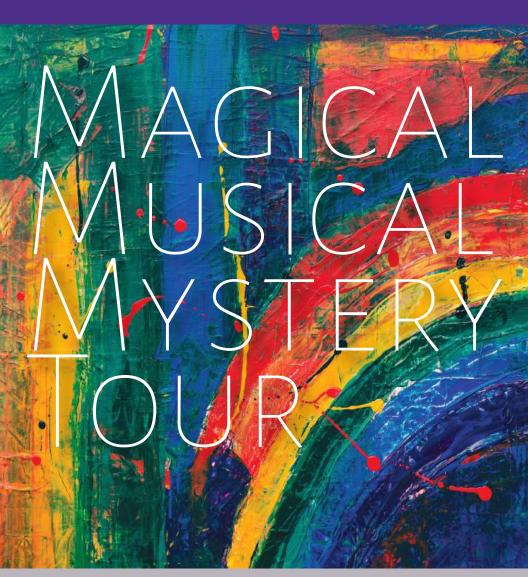

The Sault Theatre Workshop is a non-profit organization devoted to the production and promotion of live theatre in and around Sault Ste. Marie. The group was founded in 1948 and as we present our 75th season of quality productions, we look back with pride on our accomplishments. We have represented Sault Ste. Marie in many theatre festivals over the years winning much recognition. We have competed in regional, provincial and national festivals. We have sponsored and conducted workshops and training sessions in all aspects of theatre bringing many theatre professionals into our communities. We have hosted many regional and provincial drama festivals. Many of our members, young and old have moved on into professional theatre.

We currently present four productions a year and host a regional QUONTA festival of one act plays at our Studio Theatre.

The funds we require for sets, props, costumes, make-up, play royalties, advertising, building maintenance and upgrades etc. come from our admission charges, fundraisers and patron donations. and the City grant. Most of the money is spent right here in our community. Often we must raise extra funds to travel to theatre festivals or to bring professionals into our community for training purposes. We are a registered not-for-profit and can issue tax receipts.

We are very fortunate to have our own building and we strive to improve the theatre experience for our members and audience at every opportunity. We feel it is important to provide the live theatre experience in our community, to provide the training and opportunities for young and old, to make it possible to see the classic plays, the modern plays, the Canadian plays.

We welcome everyone to our theatre! We invite everyone to be part of this exciting movement; as supporting audience, as donating patron, as active participant on stage, backstage, or as a board member.

We showcase local artists and mentor emerging talent. Artists are given workshops to develop their talents not just in acting but technical training in lighting design and technical performance, as well as sound design. They can also learn how to stage manage, develop a costume design and become a wardrobe mistress. They also can become knowledgeable in finance by preparing budgets, using the box office system and handling money in the canteen.

We encourage youth, seniors, diversity in our community to become members of the Sault Theatre Workshop and we provide training and workshop opportunities and a place to feel at home in. Many of our past members have gone on to work in professional arts fields. We have had young companies in the past tell us how valuable their training was no matter what field they became a part off. We have employed Summer Students to catalog our scripts which have beren borrowed by other groups. We also have students working towards their school Community Service hours which has opened the door to them becoming a volunteer with us and getting theatre training.

Provide professional development opportunities for emerging and professional arts, culture and heritage practitioners (including Applicants)

The Sault Theatre Workshop hosts a One-act-Festival every year. We invite groups from the North to participate as well as any local theatre groups who would like to enter. The participants are encouraged to try directing and acting for the first time. We have a Professional adjudicator for the weekend who provides public adjudications on both Friday and Saturday night followed by detailed adjudications the following morning. This way we provide professional development for our own directors and actors, visiting communities, and the audience.

Fosters community connections, partnerships and networks

The Sault Theatre Workshop, the Musical Comedy Guild and the Sault Community Theatre Centre have joined forces and have set up a costume department that all theatre companies in Sault Ste. Marie can access. The movie companies shooting films in the Sault also use our costume department.

vii. What are the benefits to audiences, participants, and/or the community of Sault Ste. Marie that are intended upon successful completion and implementation of this activity, project or event? (500 words maximum):

The Sault Theatre Workshop has been presenting a four-to-five show season since 1948. The audiences have always been supportive and we have had many donations for the theatre during that time. With the community support we were able to purchase our own little theatre. This made rehearsal and performance time so much easier to schedule. As we are a workshop we have provided a safe environment for training young people. We strive to provide leadership and training in all aspects of theatre to all members. We are an advocate of community theatre in Northern Ontario and throughout Ontario.

Our audiences have always enjoyed the wide variety of theatre we provide, from Shakespeare, to dramas, to comedes, to melodramas and children's productions. We have also hosted many QUONTA Drama Festivals and Theatre Ontario Festivals bringing the best of theatre to our Sault Ste. Marie audiences. This provides training to our theatre community as well.

Our participants Have a chance of attending the workshops provided at these festivals. Listening to the adjudications each night and detailed ones in the morning are great learning experiences for the participants. They can attend the workshops provided daily for a variety of different theatre topics.

The community benefits from the participants use of our hotels, restaurants and shopping malls. We also shop locally for our set building supplies, grocery needs, etc.

The Grant received will be used towards the operation and promotion of the Sault Theatre Workshop. Because of Covid 19 we were closed for two years but because we owned our building we still had many operating/maintenance costs with no income to cover them. We have not been able to successfully get back on our feet. With many financial problems that had occurred, we were not able to get our financial picture/statement until two months ago. Scarlett Maranger, who was previously a treasurer for 15 years has rejoined the board and has been very diligent in tracking down invoices etc. to be able to present us with a financial statement. We are now working on new By-laws and a reorganization. We had many changes of boatd members during this time, however Harry Houston has now taken over the Chair's position and we hope to be in full swing in our 2024/25 season. That being said, we were not able to present a full season this year and therefore we did not have a brochure to send to our patrons. By sending out the brochures, we receive most of our donations. Not having a full season, we did not have a brochure to mail out. However, we should have a brochure and full season starting our 2024/25. season.

We are now looking out to having partners who wish to use the building. This should bring in more denoted funds

Piecing It Together Shows wishes to incorporate as a non profit and continue the work of Nicole Dyble and their former business, Dryer Fire, presenting small and medium size culturally diverse, accessible, and sustainable live music programming featuring and supporting local and touring artists.

Dyble will take on the role of Executive / Artistic Director of the organization and recruit 3-5 individuals to become board members. An effort will be made to recruit a diverse board with youth, LGBTQ2S+, and BIPOC representation. To make board positions accessible to those often excluded from such opportunities, honorariums will be offered to the board. These honorariums will be reflected in the organization's bylaws which will be guided by a consultant, mentors, and legal council, and will not be equivalent to the pay of a regular, ongoing employment position. Together with the board, consultant, and legal council, the Director will go through the process of incorporating as a non profit. The Director will also further establish the organization's brand and online presence, drawing from the experience and assets established by Dryer Fire.

In addition to further establishing this new organization, PITS will run 6 small live music events at various venues in Sault Ste. 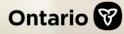

Black Fly Jam presents professional touring alternative and acoustic music concerts and performing arts, continuing 35 years of live original performance events in Sault Ste. Marie. We engage one act per month beginning in September, and ending in April. When programming, we look for artists that fit our budget, audience demand and organisational abilities. Our abilities are bound by our audience size, and geographic location. Our budget is presently bound by venue capacity and ticket prices. We are aware that the smaller size and comfort of a venue adds to what makes our events a success. Our goals include building on our wish to facilitate learning and educational opportunities; we engage performers to offer school presentations and when applicable, workshops for other interested professional creators. Student and local amateur musicians are often hired for a short set before the main act. A secure additional budget of \$1200 per show through ACAP would supplement our income and allow us to present artists of different disciplines, who may not have an active audience as of yet - as well as deliver consistent opportunity to partner with the secondary schools and other facilities and plan for additional workshops for community. This includes supporting our venue in their capacity to deliver instruction in audio-visual recording arts. We would continue to seek opportunity to co-present with community groups to benefit in building audience for us and awareness and funds for other NFP community projects. We could ensure that every show had a local opening act component, not just the ones with higher ticket sales. As a northern community, we have a great advantage in our geographic location, as a necessary stopping point for touring performers which allows for some quality talent at affordable budget. However, a consistent budget would allow for some travel funds available for payments to bring artists in by air. Our objective is to expand on these goals to continue to build audience and consistent income, accessible arts within community and opportunities for local learning

- 1.SSM has a designation as "Music City" and opportunity through Algoma University and the inclusion of a new AV studio has brought aspiring students to the music program at Algoma University. In partnership with The Loft, we support that effort and offer work experience to students in the program. We also invite and pay for "opening acts"; amateur local musicians who gain income and stage experience in a professional setting. We offer youth and artists the chance to directly talk with career artists and professional musicians in an educational setting.
- 2. Additional services we engage, such as catering, technical services, hospitality, room rental, advertising are all beneficial to the economy. Instead of travelling to Toronto for entertainment value, people enjoy world class acts here to the Sault. Online advertising and our email list attracts tourists and satelite communities to the city for our events. 3. Our consultation with other programmers, and assessing gaps within the local event community help us deliver our shows without competition and in conjunction with other presenters. Consultation with audience makes people feel invested in their community and their preferences. Within smaller focus, social time is an important part of each event. We are able to complement other performing arts groups within our region, by offering different music programming. There is no other intimate "listening room" presenter within the city. However community building goes beyond a dedicated audience, and where partnerships are possible we seek them out. Recently we staged a film, "500 Days in the Wild" which had local content about travelling the "Lake Superior Water Trail". We were so pleased to partner with a local NFP group to use all the income from this film for a fundraiser for the Lake Superior Watershed Conservancy.
- 4. Mentorship and participation for youth goes without saying. Through teaching oportunities, supporting local musicians, encouraging students by exposure to professional and world class artists, mentorship is one of our goals. If we had a larger budget we would be able to reach out more within communities that are under-represented in our programming, both culturally and regionally.
- 5,6,7. By co-presenting with other arts collectives (among but not limited to Piece it Together Shows, Sault Blues Society, The Art Hub, The Art Gallery of Algoma, The Algoma Conservatory of Music) we have increased sustainability and intend to continue that outreach. By hiring and partnering with individuals (caterers, musicians, commercial artists) at our events that positivity continues.
- 8. We have a core group of volunteers who help with our events. We make room for people who may not be able to attend events on a regular basis due to income or accessibility. Our social media is interactive and always open for discussion. 9. All of the above!
  - vii. What are the benefits to audiences, participants, and/or the community of Sault Ste. Marie that are intended upon successful completion and implementation of this activity, project or event? (500 words maximum):

Presenting shows on a regular basis is important to our audience and comparable to a show at Massey Hall in Toronto, or another venerable concert hall in a big city. And it is significantly less expensive, and much more comfortable. The opportunity to see a performance in an intimate venue, with chance to actually talk with the performer is very special. Offering that opportunity to a northern audience, and especially to youth, and to aspiring artists is prime. As well, our partnerships within the community help immensely in creating opportunities for other connections - i.e. mentoring and inspiring music students, bringing performances to other less mobile audiences, through additional performances and matinee events, hosting workshops for audio producers and sound recording, incorporating NFP partners for fundraisers, supporting other venues and event promoters through affiliation, showcasing local artists to our audience for local events and career opportunities, showcasing local caterers and musicians, and creating other social connections between individuals and businesses.

Of benefit to the economy of Sault Ste. Marie, we are able to present our interested performers with information to showcase the new recording studio that was built with grants from the city, and is situated within the same venue. This recording suite contains state of the art equipment and technical support to attract many performance artists, especially of our specific calibre and genre. To that end, we have been volunteering expertise to help The Loft build a promotional package to present to performers for their specific recording needs. We hope to see Sault Ste. Marie become known as a destination for recording arts.

viii. If ACAP funding for this activity, project or event is approved, please describe what the applicant considers to be successful implementation. How will the applicant measure success (250 words maximum):

Success is measured in sustainability, robust ticket sales and finishing out the season with enough income generated to begin a new one. But for us sustainability is also measured by how to achieve that state - which means continually attracting new audience, being pertinent in a community, and the variety of events you present and the amount of community interactions/ partnerships you engage with.

Being able to afford a higher performance fee, and to present notable performers is success, because that keeps an audience avid. It will also be measured in enough income available to hold over artists for one more day, and subsidize school shows and workshops for music students.

Age attrition is a constant threat for community groups - attracting youth is important, and programming for youth is an area we need to always be aware of. Success would include being able to offer a lower fee for students and youth, and families.

Through the added attraction of being able to record both audio and visual components of a performance, our attentive and intimate size of audience is an asset to any performer seeking a live recording, either as a product for sale or as a tool in their promotional package for other buyers. In this way the venue and event and the city become part of a much bigger world-wide audience. Keeping that in mind, the artists who use this promo material are asked to promote the facility and organisation where it was filmed. Sault Ste. Marie gains an audience in that way. The opportunity to present live-stream concerts is also a possibility.

If we did have a committed budget per show, we would be able to diversify our performances to attract specific and new audiences. The committed funds would offset any downturn in regular audience attendance. Engaging diverse performers outside of our audience favourites would help with gentrification or attrition within our select audience, and allow for new community engagement.

ii. Please describe any specific audiences that are intended to be reached with the activity, project, or event (150 words maximum):

As mentioned previously, we wish to expand our audiences to a larger diverse community. To that end, we are seeking marketing opportunities within identifiable communities, both communities of interest, and cultural diversity. Interest communities might be described as musical theatre, comedy, multilingual, audio-visual, storytelling or book readings, for example.

Communities of cultural diversity could be exemplified as different Settler ethnicities, First Nations, youth, new Canadians. We are open to learning more about what is available within our mandate to complement and enhance our communities. To date, we have co-presented several shows with The Algoma Conservatory of Music that could be defined as a cross- genre of music, marrying classical and indie-folk, and we have seen a satisfying influx of new audience to other shows because of that cross-over of genre, and marketing.

iii. How will the activity, project, or event be promoted? Please describe and include any links to social media accounts or relevant websites or organizations (maximum 250 words):

There is an established email list that recieves advance notice of all events, as a newsletter. We also have a Facebook and Instagram account as Black Fly Jam, that has close to 1000 followers. Interaction is encouraged, and events and news items are published regularly. We have partnerships within several other social events groups who share our events either within their own newsletters, or within their social media. We buy advertising from SooToday/Village Media, for front page as well as event listings, and arrange interviews between the artist and published news media - SooToday, Sault Star, CBC Radio and Adrian Vilaca on The Borderline. Adrian Vilaca often incorporates that interview and music into his podcast "The Great Lakes Odyssey" that is sold to NPR Public Radio and available as a podcast world-wide. There are several free listings we take advantage of - CBC Northern Ontario Radio, Arts and Culture SSM, SooToday events.

Many of these are also duplicated by our venue, The Algoma Conservatory of Music, on their own social media and newsletter mailouts.

Thank you for the opportunity to apply for this grant, and many thanks to Aliesha for her guidance and information sessions regarding this suitability and process for the Arts and Culture Assistance Program for Black Fly Jam.

We hope that the application sent by email Thursday October 24th will fulfill the requirements expected by the committee. I am also including two letters of support, as well as this final letter today.

I appreciate the opportunity in this cover letter to speak directly to the committee about the presentations that Black Fly Jam brings to our community, and why we are seeking supplementary funding.

As an organisation with a proven track record of success, we have delivered a very capable and complementary concert season to an appreciative audience for many years now. We are versatile in our event presentations, working with community partners, different venues, and many styles of events, ranging from festivals (Searchmont Music Festival, 2014) to film presentations supporting local advocacy (500 Days in the Wild, presented with The Lake Superior Watershed Council, 2024.) All of this variety is directly in response to our enjoyment of community involvement, education and interactions.

We also have a sensible attitude to staying within a budget and searching out any possible advantages so that we can make our events of greater value to all involved. (This includes hiring local opening acts and caterers, arranging teaching workshops, presenting satellite shows for youth and schools.)

However our constant endeavour to serve a bigger population, different audiences, and to make the performances we present not only great entertainment, but also pertinent as a learning and educative tool for community, is always compromised by budget restrictions, which are dependent on returns we receive through ticket sales.

In a simple way of describing it, we are in a cocoon of comfort that does not allow us to spread our resources further, and to grow our abilities. We do the best we can in a fluctuating budget to add values, but as resources become scarcer and community funds more fragmented, we are forced further into the cocoon that threatens to atrophy, through audience attrition and repetition of what is achievable, i.e, just a concert venue, and a specific style of entertainment talent.

If supplementary funds were available, we would have the opportunity to build our resources to reach the next level. Funds would support fees for secondary shows for performances and workshops, and paying for associated overall costs, artist fees, hospitality, travel and production, that are not possible to cover through just ticket sales.

The benefits of reaching a wider community are a winning situation for everyone!

My name is Dmytro, I'm from Poltava. I have loved mountains and sports all my life. I worked as a ski instructor at a resort in Georgia until the war turned my life upside down. At this time, I broke my leg, which became a serious problem, especially since I was planning a flight to Canada. I decided to look for support as I would need help getting around. By some chance, I came across the Waterloo Grassroots Response website through Google. I filled out a form on their website, hoping someone could help.

I was happily surprised when the volunteers responded quickly. They started preparing assistance for me even before my arrival. When I arrived in Canada, already with a broken leg, the volunteers met me and arranged housing in St. Jacobs — a cozy town where I could rest and begin my recovery process. They also helped with important matters: finding a doctor for my leg treatment, getting to the hospital, completing necessary paperwork, and providing transportation for trips to get medicine and groceries.

This experience was my first encounter with volunteer work, and I was amazed at how much time and effort these people put into helping me in such a difficult situation. I was incredibly grateful for their support.

Inspired by their example, I decided to join the Grassroots community and became a volunteer myself. This not only helped me better integrate into my new community but also allowed me to find my first job in Canada. Now, I have a clear goal — to obtain permanent residency (PR) in Canada. I have already attended free webinars organized by the community, where I learned about PR options, particularly in regions like Northern Ontario, where the process can be faster.

Recently, I had the chance to see the mountains again — I visited friends in Alberta. It gave me a new surge of energy and reminded me of my old passion. I have many plans and dreams, and I'm determined to achieve all my goals.

Waterloo Region, Ontario. Waterloo Region Grassroots Response to the Ukrainian Crisis (WRGR), a volunteer-led group of residents helping Ukrainian people fleeing the devastating war in their country, organized a special evening to celebrate the many people in our Region that have generously volunteered their time and opened their homes to displaced Ukrainian families.

On May 27, a fun-filled Potluck Dinner was held at the Ukrainian Catholic Centre in Kitchener. Nearly 300 people attended the event that included a mix of hosts, newcomers, and volunteers. In addition to food and lively bubbly conversation, some lively entertainment was featured including a rousing rendition of "Be Our Guest" by 13-yearold Rebecca Yakymova dressed as Belle from Beauty and the beast and a brilliant execution of the popular Ukrainian song "Nadiya Yea" delivered by a 17-year-old Newcomer.

Following a dinner that included a variety of familiar dishes, several Ukrainian people took to the stage to express their gratitude for Canadians and especially for their local host families. Dialogue included both successes and ongoing challenges involving language barriers, employment, and housing.

Stephanie Goertz, co-founder of WRGR then took the stage to speak about the dire need for more hosts, acknowledging that our volunteer group is "...facing one of their worst shortages of hosts for newcomers..." WRGR has more than 40 families in need over the next 1-2 months so the need for more hosts is urgent. Some of these newcomers have only a few days left in Government hotels and risk homelessness if housing cannot be found.

Also in attendance were Waterloo Regional Chair Karen Redmond and Mike Morrice, MP for Kitchener Centre. The evening concluded with some fun raffles for prizes and giveaways of donated toys, food, clothing, and other items including hundreds of dollars worth of reusable lunch products generously contributed by Fenigo in Waterloo.

# Grassroots Response makes Northern tour for Ukraine newcomers

The Grassroots Response to the Ukrainian Crisis team has been on an epic road trip through the North to meet with local organizations and community leaders to discuss ways to support and integrate Ukrainian newcomers into the workforce.

First stop was in North Bay, then on to the Sault, Thunder Bay, back to the Sault, and finally, they stopped again in North Bay this past Friday. Then it was back home to Waterloo, where the organization is based.

"We are so excited about coming to the north and the overwhelming support we have received from the community," said Stephanie Goertz, who founded the Grassroots Response to the Ukrainian Crisis group.

"The Northern communities have been incredibly accepting and open to the idea of supporting additional Ukrainian newcomers. It's heartwarming to see the willingness to help and make a positive impact."

Essentially, Goertz and the many volunteers who keep the group going strong are working to make connections with Northern cities who may need specialized work, work that might align with the skills of someone coming from the Ukraine.

A steady job helps Ukrainians achieve permanent residence status within the country, and is a vital step in the process. Goertz noted that many who came to Canada to escape the war were given work visas, not offers of permanent residences.

The Grassroots Response to the Ukrainian Crisis group also helps to house recent arrivals, renting nine houses in the Kitchener / Waterloo area to serve as temporary housing. Neither the provincial or federal government helps them with this, all the money comes from donations, and hundreds of volunteers help the organization run.

For example, this past March Dmytro Suprum arrived from eastern Ukraine to Toronto's Pearson Airport, "looking for a place where I can safely settle for the long-term." He had surgery before he came, but didn't want to miss his window to arrive, so even though he was recovering on crutches, he made the trip.

"I didn't know where I would go," once he made his way off the plane to the airport, as "the government hotels were full," Goertz added. However, after some Google searches he was able to connect with the Grassroots Response to the Ukrainian Crisis group, and someone went down to pick him up, and gave him a place to stay in one of their transitional homes. Since then, he's been working on a farm this summer.

He joined Goertz on this Northern tour, so he's getting to see a lot of the province he hopes to call home permanently.

At any given time, Goertz noted, "we are supporting 140 people" within their temporary housing. Besides the nine rental homes they have, the group has also been renting student apartments throughout the summer for additional housing.

Goertz founded the group because "I just knew I had to do something," to help Ukrainians trying to start a new life in Canada, "but at no point did I think that we would be creating what we're creating right now."

Five weeks ago, she noted, the group was granted not-for-profit status.

As of today, "we have helped over 1,000 people with housing," she added, either through their own homes, "or through our hosting network."

Indeed, the organization is driven by the good works of many volunteers, some of whom help set up new arrivals with housing. Goertz said she also works to keep lines of communication open between other community groups who may be able to help, or at least point the way to someone who can.

Hence the road trip north, which saw Goertz and Suprum meeting with local politicians, service clubs, multi-cultural groups, and other grassroots collectives like their own. The idea was to build bridges, to open communications, and see if some of the Kitchener Waterloo Ukrainians would be welcome and supported in Northern communities.

"We're trying to recognize how we've been able to mobilize local volunteers," Goertz added, "and we've been connecting with various groups across Northern Ontario which has been very successful."

"We try to build a bridge" between what a community needs, and what can be offered, and "our priority is housing, employment, and social support" for newcomers.

Goertz outlined there are many challenges to achieve permanent residence in Canada for Ukrainian newcomers, however, since arriving in March, Suprum has felt welcomed by the people he's met.

"Canadian people are so welcoming and friendly," he said, "and I'm very grateful for all the support and help."

Goertz also added that the group is always interested to hear from organizations or people willing to help, so if you missed her on this tour, you can always reach out via the Grassroots Response to the Ukrainian Crisis website at wrgrassrootsresponse.ca. 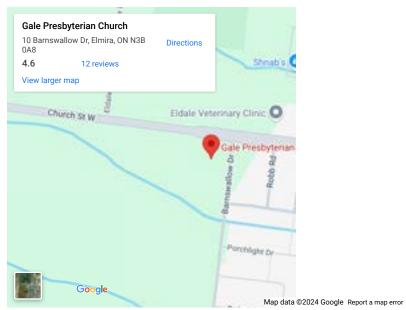

The Kosenko family had always been strong, supporting each other no matter how difficult things got. They lived in Kharkiv, right in the heart of the city, when the war suddenly began. It was like a lighting bolt out of the blue. The first days felt unreal: sirens, the echo of explosions, empty streets. Everything that had once been familiar and comforting suddenly became hostile and dangerous.

Gathering only the essentials, the family embarked on a long journey to escape the threat looming over their city and country. The road to Canada was tough, but they stuck together, despite all the challenges. And it was in Canada, in a peaceful and cozy town of Waterloo, that their fifth daughter, Maria, was born. Her arrival was seen as a symbol of hope, a testament that life goes on even in the darkest times.

After Kharkiv was liberated in the summer of 2022, the Kosenkos decided to return home. They dreamed of walking through their familiar streets again, seeing the places they knew, and feeling the warmth of their Homeland. But when they arrived, they were met with a different city. Kharkiv had changed beyond recognition: destruction, scorched buildings, no electricity, water, or heat. But the most painful thing was the loss of the peace and comfort that once prevailed there.

They endured power outages, freezing nights without heat, and constant bombardments. The difficult days dragged on one after another, but the Kosenkos did not break. They found the strength and courage to preserve their love for their native city, supporting each other and believing they could rebuild their lives in their homeland.

But in 2024, the enemy broke through the defenses, and battles were being fought just 30 kilometers from Kharkiv. Now, every day, the sounds of artillery echoed over the city, and air raid alarms rarely ceased, even the air felt heavy with tension. The family once again decided to move to Canada, to the familiar Waterloo region. They settled in the same town and neighborhood, and from the first day, they felt an extraordinary sense: it seemed as if nothing had changed, as if they had never left. It felt like the two years of horrors had been just a terrible dream from which they had finally awakened. Now, a new life was unfolding before them, filled with hope and peace, where they could forget all the hardships they had endured and learn to enjoy each day again.

It is always a pleasure to share wonderful stories of families who have found their place in another country, in a new society. This is all thanks to the support of caring Canadians and volunteers.

Here is a new story... Some readers will see something similar to their own stories in it and sincerely rejoice for this family. Some will see hope and a chance for positive change. Others may feel motivated to take a first step to help newcomers.

In February 2023, a family from the Poltava region in Kremenchuk, Ukraine flew to Toronto. Lesia, Serhii, and their three children: Sviatoslav - 11 years old, Milana - 8 years old, and Myroslav - 6 years old, were fleeing the war. At the airport, caring volunteers accommodated them in a hotel, where the family was permitted to stay for two weeks. Lesia found the volunteer organization Grassroots and contacted the volunteers, asking for help with housing after the hotel became unavailable for them. Within 24 hours, volunteers offered the help of hosts who were ready to provide a house for the family. Two days later, the hosts came to pick up the family and take them home.

Lynn and Harold Martin from Wellesley are becoming a new family in Canada for this family of newly arrived Ukrainians. The Martins are incredible people who opened not only their doors but also their hearts to them.

The families worked together during this period of adaptation to a new country. Thanks to the Martins' recommendation, Serhii found a great job, the children were placed in good schools, and all the necessary documents were processed very quickly.

The Martins did everything possible to support the new arrivals and make their transition to a new life less stressful and more comfortable. Their help was not only material, but also emotional. The Ukrainian family lived together with the hosts for a year and three months. During this time, they developed a close relationship.

Connections like this help create a community where everyone supports each other. The mutual respect, understanding and kindness makes such relationships special and valuable.

When we lend a helping hand, we not only change another person's life, but also give meaning to our own life. Every good deed, every word of support, has incredible power – the power to inspire, heal and give hope. After all, by helping others, we help ourselves to be better, stronger and more compassionate.

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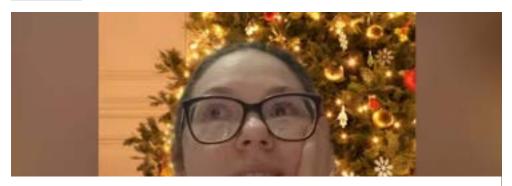

# Struggles to find affordable housing and work force some Ukrainian refugees to leave Waterloo region

'Waterloo region is extremely expensive for anyone,' advocate says

Lack of affordable housing and work in Waterloo region has forced some Ukrainian refugees to leave. Alina Baryshnik and her husband came to the region in the spring of 2023, but a few months later she and her husband, as well as their baby, went back to Ukraine.



A lack of affordable housing and difficulties finding work has forced some Ukrainian refugees to rethink whether or not they can stay in Waterloo region and in some cases, families have left the area.

That was the case for 27-year-old Alina Baryshnik, who came to Canada in December 2022. Her husband joined her one month later.

In a video interview from Kyiv, Baryshnik told CBC News she thought she and her husband would be able to settle relatively quickly when they first tried to live in Brampton.

"I though because my husband has good English, that he would find a good job very fast, but at first he couldn't find any," she said.

She and her husband worked in the medical field in Ukraine and her husband was hoping to get work in a similar field, but was not able to, Baryshnik said. She said she couldn't work at the time because she had just given birth.

Baryshnick said they were also struggling with the high cost of rent and it got to a point where they wouldn't be able to pay it.

It was at that point Baryshnik said they needed to look for other options and moved to Waterloo region in the spring of 2023 after learning the Waterloo Region Grassroots Response to the Ukrainian Crisis group helps Ukrainian refugees find temporary housing and work.

 These students built a website to help rehome people in Turkey, Syria and Ukraine

Baryshnik said the group helped them get temporary housing for three months in the region and her husband was able to find work, but as the time to stay at the guest house was almost up, her husband lost his job.

"I was frustrated and scared," she said. "We had a small baby, I didn't have a job and it was hard for my husband to find something."

Baryshnik said she left Waterloo region in September 2023 to deal with a family emergency in Ukraine. A month after she arrived, her husband was still struggling to find work in the region and they decided it would be better for him to join her back in Ukraine.

# Rent in Waterloo region higher than Calgary

Emmanuel Baffoe and his family went through a similar situation. He, his wife and baby were in Mississauga for three weeks before moving to St. Jacobs in the summer of 2023.

The family is now living in Calgary.

"We said, 'OK that's a good beginning for us,' and after doing some research about Waterloo and Kitchener, I realized it was a place where I could get a good job," he told CBC News.

Baffoe got a job in construction, but struggled to find housing his family could afford. Many places were asking for \$2,000 a month, which was the majority of his monthly income at the time.

"Any [rentals] were asking for ridiculous requirements. I had to pay six months upfront, provide a guarantor or I had to have six months of continuous employment and I did not meet all these requirements," he said.

"I went to see 20 different apartments. None of them gave me the opportunity to rent."

In Calgary, Baffoe said he has been able to find work and housing he can afford.

"What is \$2,000 in Waterloo is \$1,300 here in Calgary," he said.

# **Lack of Canadian experience**

Stephanie Goertz is the lead organizer and founder of Waterloo Region Grassroots Response to the Ukrainian Crisis. She told CBC News they're seeing more Ukrainians leave the region because many don't have government support for housing and it's up to them to find accommodations and work.

"Waterloo region is extremely expensive for anyone and there is a housing shortage," she said.

"That's why we have rented out facilities and properties and created our own temporary housing solutions for people who would otherwise be homeless."

The group helps run the former <u>Jakobstettel County Inn</u> guest house in St.Jacobs and has connections with other guest houses in Brunner, Hillside, Palmerston and Listowel.

She said the group is currently struggling with finding more host homes for Ukrainians. At the beginning of the war. many people opened up their homes, she said. But now, Goertz says, the offers of space have almost completely stopped.

The group also helps Ukrainians find work, but without Canadian work experience, Goertz said trying to find employment can be a struggle.

"It's extremely difficult for them when they don't have Canadian credentials, work experience in Canada and they probably don't have the level of English that jobs [require]," she said.

# Housing, employment a challenge for other refugees

Finding work and housing they can afford is a struggle that goes beyond Ukrainian refugees. It's also impacting the <u>dozens of refugee claimants coming to Waterloo</u> region every month, said Lucia Harrison, CEO of the K-W Multicultural Centre.

There is not enough low-income housing available in the region she said. For refugees who struggle with English, the employment available to them is not enough to cover

 Agencies working with refugee claimants in Waterloo region say more supports needed, call for government help

The broader community who is in need of housing, as well as international students, is also adding pressure to a shortage of low income hosing in the region.

"We have a problem for people who have lived here for a long time who are in low-income, we have a problem for new people arriving," Harrison said. "The issue really is, how do we expedite low-cost housing in our community"

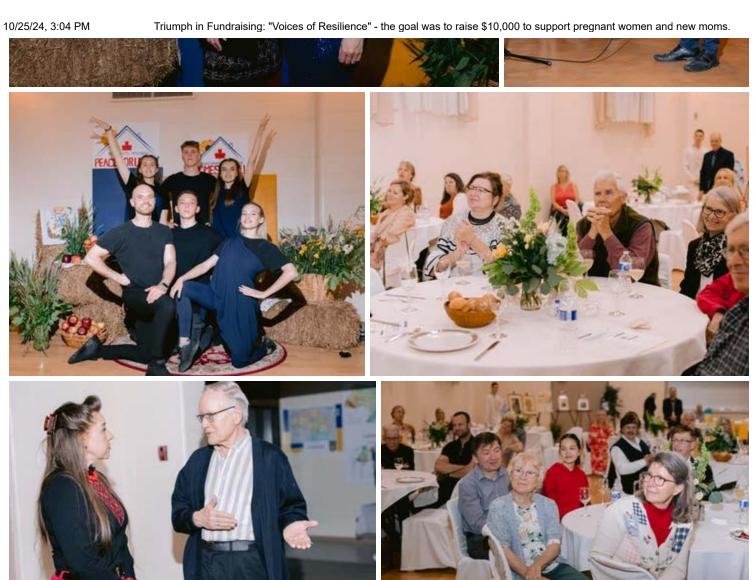

# Volunteer group secures 2 guest houses in Waterloo for Ukrainian refugees

Federal allotment of 2-week hotel stay is not enough time to secure a job, housing: settlement volunteer

A local volunteer group has secured two new guest houses for newly landed Ukrainian refugees arriving in Waterloo region.

One is a five-bedroom apartment, offered by a local landlord. The second is an apartment owned by Wilfrid Laurier University, a student residence, with five single bedrooms and a shared living space. Both are being rented to the group for \$2,000 a month.

"This was basically agreed upon last Wednesday and we already have people moved in yesterday and today," said Stephanie Goertz, a volunteer and founding member of Waterloo Region Grassroots Response to the Ukrainian Crisis.

Both are short-term agreements until the end of August, said Goertz, but will go a long way in providing people with a softer landing when they arrive in the region.

When people escape the war in Ukraine and arrive in Canada, the federal government puts them up in a hotel for up to two weeks. Many are not prepared for the uphill climb that awaits, said Goertz.

"A place to live, a place to work within those two weeks?" said Goertz. "Most of us cannot find a single place to live within two weeks. Let alone a job and a place to live ... without speaking English, perhaps, with having no references, maybe not having a resume, no form of transportation and very little revenue."

#### Low vacancy rate in Waterloo region

Ukrainians who arrive can open a Canadian bank account and are eligible for transitional financial assistance of \$3,000 per adult and \$1,500 per child from the federal government, but that can take time to process, said Goertz, and there's reluctance to spend all that money in case it's needed later.

"If they don't find employment, many of them have a return ticket, or many of them are unwilling to spend the last thousand or two thousand dollars to fly back home because they see no other option."

According to the most recent Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation numbers in October 2022, the vacancy rate in Kitchener, Cambridge and Waterloo was 1.2 per cent. The average price of a one-bedroom apartment was \$1,327, while a two-bedroom apartment was \$1,454.

The rising cost of living — especially rent — has made the role of host families more important, said Goertz.

"One of the ladies, a 60-year-old woman, was in a bus shelter when she sent me a message on Facebook and she had nowhere to go. So we rushed down and we picked her up around 11 p.m., got her to an emergency host at midnight and the next day she was with another host and her hosts are sharing, learning each others' language and meals."

Randy Kraemer, his wife and six children live north of Waterloo region, near Conestoga Lake. His family signed up to be a host family with Waterloo Region Grassroots Response to the Ukrainian Crisis months ago, but it wasn't until April that they were matched with a couple in their mid-30s.

"It's who we are. We're called to help one another and this is one way of fulfilling that calling," said Kraemer, who is a Markham Waterloo Mennonite.

"We did not want any pets in our house, we didn't want anyone drinking or smoking, and we don't have a TV, so we had all these stipulations, I guess, and we weren't sure if anybody was actually going to come because of all that."

#### Hosting is 'humbling'

But Ukrainian refugees Oleks and Halyna Dovbush didn't seem to mind, he said. He had a background in welding and building; she was a seamstress. They arrived just before the Easter long weekend in April and by Monday morning, the Kraemers' friends, family and business acquaintances had come together to find the pair work and a place to live in Waterloo, close to transit.

"That was so, so amazing. We just felt like we were part of this beautiful story. It was humbling, really," said Kraemer. "It was nothing we did — it was just God's timing. It was a beautiful thing."

Kraemer said Oleks got his G1 on Monday and Halyna is learning English in order to enter the workforce.

"They're doing very well on their own," he said. His family and the Dovbushes have visited several times in the last month.

Goertz said her group continues to look for host families, as refugees arrive in the region several times a week. She said people don't need to worry about having only one bathroom or a dedicated kitchen for the family they're hosting.

"They do not need a second kitchen. They don't need a second living room or extra space. Many of these guests are grateful for a bed to sleep in."

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O ctober 24

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I would like to share a story about an amazing girl I met. Her name is Solomiya and she is just 14 years old.

Once upon a time, a long, long time ago, Solomiya's family was a happy Ukrainian family. "Were" does not mean that they are unhappy now. It's just that happiness can be different, and manifest itself in different ways. After all, they are still together, with Faith, Hope and Love. It's not so much about the word happiness, it's about the embodiment of this concept.

Solomia and her parents, like thousands of Ukrainians, were forced to flee the war. In April 2023, the family flew to Canada for the first time, But their hopes did not work out this first time; Solomia's parents could not find work, and the family could not find any affordable housing. It is hard to imagine what happens to the soul of a person who is forced to return to a place where it is intolerable, where it is dangerous, where no one expects you to be anymore. But...they had no choice but to go back to their native land. From there, Solomia's father remotely searched for a job in Canada, in order for his family to have a chance at a more stable and sustainable "new life" in Canada the second time.

And so, at the beginning of September 2023 - Solomiya and her parents returned to Canada. Not with tears and worries, but with more faith and hope. Having found a home to live in, they were able to receive furniture donations from local community members. This made things so much easier, and in the process, the family learned about an organization that helps newcomers from Ukraine get settled, the Waterloo Region Grassroots Response. The first person the family met was Maryanne, who they describe as a kind, sensitive and sincere woman who became a friend of the family and still supports and helps them when they need it. Solomiya and her parents often talk about this wonderful volunteer and friend with such frank gratitude.

Solomiya, still a teenager, has now also become a volunteer. Because a person who knows what kindness is, is able to understand how important it is to support another. Over the summer months, she and a friend helped arrange guest houses and call new arrivals to find out what help they needed. Solomiya is currently drawing beautiful pictures for the coming holidays. You have no idea how beautifully she draws. At just 14, she has an amazing talent. Her creative art expresses her love for the people she meets and for the work that she does as a volunteer helping other Ukrainians fleeing from war.

Despite her young age, Solomia is more mature and emotionally resilient than you might think. She is a very attentive listener and shows empathy for the feelings of others. In fact, she often inspires adults with her faith in the future and her enthusiasm, showing that difficulties can be overcome.

Each individual lives and experiences events differently. People have the right to "ground" in the way that is best for them. Some people immerse themselves in work, some in volunteering, some rush headlong into studies - it doesn't matter if it helps them live on. If you know what you can do to help, offer help and accept when people are not ready. Sometimes it takes time.

"Good is returned with good" is a truth that is reflected in our lives again and again. Kindness has an amazing capacity to multiply: every small act of kindness creates ripples that

influence others and encourage them to do good deeds as well. Even when our efforts seem invisible, they can make a great difference to another person's life and inspire positive change. And the great power of doing good, is it always finds its way back.

Bawating Babes is a 2Spirit|Indigenous led drag and burlesque troupe in Bawating/Sault Ste. Marie. We are a creative collective of drag, burlesque artists with a mix of First Nation, Métis and allied performers. Theodore Syrette aka Bette U. Wanna of Batchewana, is the house mother/creative director.

We have a cast and crew of 20+ folks. We partner with the 2Spirit Organizing Committee and the Algoma University Student Union and have partnered in the past with the VIBE festival (Country Hoe-Down 2024), Tourism Sault Ste. Marie (Pride Cruise and After Party 2023, 2024), and the SPARK Project (2Spirit Awareness Week 2024).

This year, the Bawating Babes completed two success road shows. Including one in September 2024 at Laurentian University. And the very first drag show, in Delaware Nation of the Thames in June.

In 2023-2024, the babes were awarded a grant with the Algoma Community Fund. This grant allowed Theodore Syrette to design a training program for folks interested in getting into or polishing their drag skills and personnes. These funds resulted in 2 new local drag performers. A successful drag workshops

The Bawating Babes, and their organizing partnership with the 2Spirit Organizing Committee of Bawating have partnered with the City of Sault Ste. Marie in different capacities, listed previously in Section 1 (v).

Bawating Babes productions include some event participants traveling to Sault Ste. Marie, and contributing to the local economies e.g. purchases within local venues, hotel/motel/Airbnb stays, local catering contracts, etc.

Organisers engage with workshop/show participants, cast and crew and community partners on how to create more inclusive and accessible shows in Sault Ste. Marie. E.g. all venues with physical accessibility are chosen over non-accessible venues, community support tickets, etc.

Participants build professional-working relationships with facilitators, hosts, organizers/volunteers and other performers during shows. No formal mentoring is initiated, but it's a lot of comradery and mutual support where a lot of growth occurs.

Bawating Babe productions would not exist without volunteers. All primary organizers are volunteers. Our volunteers range from university students, seniors, 2Spirit LGBTQQIA+ community members and allies.

Formally, known as House of Ever Sick - Bawating, our first under that name was on November 9th, 2022, under the guidance of Theodore Syrette. The group name changed in January of 2024 to Bawating Babes. However, since November 2022 the Babes have organized and delivered over a dozen shoes Ste. Marie, and elsewhere. The Bawating Babes are able to introduce and encourage more people to the art of drag, burlesque and other forms of performing and multi-disciplinary arts practices.

These shows also give back to the community and are put towards additional 2Spirit and LGBTQQIA+ community programming, such as 2Spirit sharing circles, 2SLGBTQQIA+ family fun days e.g. bowling, art nights, etc. and awareness and capacity building for First Nation and 2SLGBTQQIA+ allies, leaders and service providers.

vii. What are the benefits to audiences, participants, and/or the community of Sault Ste. Marie that are intended upon successful completion and implementation of this activity, project or event? (500 words maximum):

The successful completion of this project will see an increase in safe social environments for the 2Spirit and LGBTQQIA+ members of the community, their allies and loved ones included. This project will also be led by 2Spirit and LGBTQQIA+ artist and organisers for the general public of Sault Ste. Marie.

There are events and projects for Indigenous people of Sault Ste. Marie. There are events and projects by the LGBTQQIA+ community as well. However, there is a lack of projects and events organised and led, for the 2spirit and intersectional identities of First Nation, Metis, Inuit and 2SLGBTTQIA+ peoples. This project, with the partnership of the City of Sault Ste. Marie, can help fill in that gap, and make Sault Ste. Marie more of a friendlier city of Algoma.

Bawating Babes follows the teaching that whoever shows up, is supposed to be there. Overall we had 12 participants for the Bawating D.R.A.G. project 2023-2024. This created 3 new local performers in the community. Including one 2Spirit, two First Nations and one allied performer. Several local performers were able to attend these workshops and grow their skills. Each participant had different opportunities to practise their routines and new skills at any of the four seasonal drag shows, that were designed along with the Bawating D.R.A.G. project.

This project will also measure success by documenting the events through photography and social media. Additional funding in procurement, will also go towards a website, to also promote and document this project as well as projects, conducted by Bawating Babes and their community partners.

Organisers and volunteers will also track the number of participants and audience members of each show and workshop. This data will be included in progress and final reports.

#### **Biography**

Theodore (Teddy) Syrette - Ozhawa Anung/Yellow Star is an Anishinabe person of Batchewana First Nation. They grew up on Ranking Reserve, within the city limits of Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario. Teddy began writing as a young child, which would lead them to become a poet. Their interest in television and film, would lead them to community theatre. Their love of stage performing and understanding of their Indigeneity, would allow them to learn how to be a resourceful storyteller. Today Teddy combines the art of storytelling, group narratives and humour to facilitate group conversations surrounding homophobia, transphobia, racism and decolonization. In 2021 they began painting and conducting paint nights.

In 2022, they started to perform drag under the name Bette U. Wanna of Batchewana. They are now the artistic director of Bawating Babes, a 2Spirit-Indigenous drag and burlesque troupe. Birthed out of House of Ever Sick - Bawating Chapter (baa), Bawating Babes have curated and showcased close to 20 drag shows in Sault Ste. Marie, Delaware Nation of the Thames First Nation and Sudbury Ontario.

Bawating Babes help raise funds to support the grassroots group, 2Spirit Organising Committee of Bawating. 2SOC is a grassroots group that builds awareness and community events for 2Spirit, Indigi-Queer community members, and allies.

Theodore Syrette | Bette U. Wanna organised and delivered the first drag 101 workshop series 2023-2024. This was a project funded by the Algoma Community Foundation's *GSC Community Impact Fund: Creating Communities of Care for Algoma*. This allowed them to hire local and out of town professionals, to conduct workshops to local artists. Guest artists were also invited to showcase their talents in Bawating, with seasonal drag shows that accompanied their workshops, respectively.

The Bawating Babes is currently locating funding to deliver another series of workshops and seasonal drag shows with project Bawating D.R.A.G. - Drag. Research. And Glamour. The Babes are also booked with future shows in Bawating, Montreal and Thunder Bay.

# 2Spirit Awareness Week & Gathering - Bawating March 2024

2Spirit Organising Committee of Bawating

#### Overview

The 2Spirit Organising Committee (2SOC) of Bawating held the second annual 2Spirit Awareness Week and second 2Spirit Gathering of Bawating in Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario and Rankin Reserve of Batchewana First Nation. 2Spirit, Indigi-queer and Indigenous - 2SLGBTQ+ people are underserved and face higher rates of discrimination, lateral violence and marginalisation by both Indigenous and other LGBTQ+ community members throughout Turtle Island.

In 2022, the 2Spirit Program of the Community Based Research Centre (CBRC), hosted the first 2Spirit Awareness Day on March 21st, 2022 in Vancouver, BC. A member of the program at CBRC, attended an online 2Spirit hangout with Kimberely Pelletier and Teddy Syrette | Ozhawa Anung Kwe. They shared information about the second 2Spirit Awareness Day in late 2022, early 2023. The 2Spirit Organising Committee hosted the first 2Spirit gathering of Bawating on November 9, 2022.

This week-long celebration is to bring awareness and connect 2Spirit, Indigi-queer, and Indigenous-LGBTQ+ community members and their allies together in solidarity. This report provides an overview of the 2Spirit Awareness Week and Gathering in Bawating 2024.

#### **SPARK Mentorship - Tourism Innovation Lab**

2Spirit Organising Committee of Bawating and the Community Based Research Centre - 2Spirit Program - Martin Morberg & Jaylene McRae

The 2Spirit Organising Committee of Bawating used the Spark funding to support the second annual 2Spirit Awareness Week of Bawating and the second 2Spirit Gathering of Bawating. A week of social networking, ceremonial practices, and building awareness in support of 2Spirit, Inidigi-queer and Indigenous-LGBTQ+ community members.

The Community Based Research Centre - 2Spirit Program organised the first 2Spirit Awareness day in 2022 in Vancouver, British Columbia. The 2Spirit Organising Committee was supported by the CBRC - 2Spirit Program in 2023 for the first annual 2Spirit Awareness Week in Bawating (Sault Ste. Marie, ON). It was fitting for the 2Spirit Organising Committee to request the CBRC 2Spirit Program be their mentor for the SPARK funding and mentorship project.



The first round of SPARK funding supported the airfare (Porter Airlines) and accommodation (Holiday Inn Express - Sault Ste. Marie) for 2Spirit elder Ma-Nee Chacaby. The second funding instalment will go towards covering the catering for the 2Spirit Gathering.

- Not able to provide cultural materials and cultural items e.g. ribbon shirts/skirts/pants/shorts, regalia smudge, as well as teachings to go with each item
- QR Codes were not accessible; confusing

- More transportational support for community members and volunteers e.g. bus passes, ride shares, etc.
- Develop a stronger promotional plan to get the message out there to more attendees

#### **CBRC Mentorship Notes**

As the mentorship programming of SPARK comes to a close, the 2Spirit Organising Committee of Bawating and the Community Based Resource Centre - 2Spirit Program will continue to work with each other in solidarity and celebration of 2Spirit, Indigi-queer and Indigenous-LGBTQ+ greatness and resiliency. Here are some results from the mentorship:

- Flag raising on the actual day of the spring solstice
  - 2SOC can advocate for local Indigenous nations to partake in their own
     2Spirit Awareness day/week, celebrations, etc.
- Leaders across the country should have a meeting to have a dialogue about 2Spirit Day/Awareness Week
  - CBRC to create doodle to network the different 2Spirit Awareness day/week movements throughout Turtle Island

This progress report is for the GSC Community Impact Fund: Creating Communities of Care for Algoma regarding the Drag Workshops & Seasonal Drag Show project. This document has been created by grant writer and project lead, Teddy Syrette | Ozhawa Anung Kwe/Yellow Star Woman aka Bette U. Wanna of Batchewana. This report includes an update on project delivery and the current budget of the project.

#### **Drag Workshops**

On August 9th the project coordinator conducted a meeting with each workshop presenter either in person or via zoom at the Delta Hotel in Sault Ste. Marie, ON. Each presenter was able to finalise details for registration, resource and location requirements/suggestions. To date, three of four community workshops have been successfully delivered. Here is an overview of the workshops that have been delivered so far.

# Burlesque 101 with Indigi-Babez (facilitated by Madame Odemin Surprise - Denise McLeod)

- Friday October 6th from 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM
- Hosted at the Mane Street & Co.
- 4 participants attended the workshop, 1 visitor by 2Spirit Organising Committee Member, Kimberly Pelletier
- This workshop was paired with the first seasonal drag show (fall) Burlesque and Drag Show on Saturday October 23rd held at the Moose Lodge
- The cost of the workshop and artist fees for Burlesque & Drag show was \$2968.00. With the cost of local talent fees (4 performers) and rental venue for show, the total cost of the first workshop and 1st seasonal drag show cost the project \$3468.00. Luckily, additional community funders/partnerships were able to offset any over budget items.
  - Denise McLeod and Neno Okasi are from a Toronto Indigenous burlesque troupe called Indigi-Babez.

4 participants attended both workshops

#### **Results of Workshops**

Workshop participants were able to receive a \$25.00 honorarium for attending each workshop. In total 8 people who are just starting out in drag or wanted to enhance their skill sets were able to attend the workshops so far. Three workshop participants have been able to take the incentive and debut their drag performances at the New Years Eve Party. That included performers such as *The Bride*, *Dalton Verona*, *and Alvarez from da Rez*.

Note that Alvarez debuted during Bebe Lala's online Drag Persona Development workshop with a virtual performance.

# **Seasonal Drag Shows**

Burlesque & Drag Show (fall) - October 7th, 2023

Two out of four drag shows have been delivered with great success. *The Burlesque and Drag Show (fall)* had roughly 80 people in attendance at the Moose Lodge in Sault Ste. Marie. The Indigi-Babez, an Indigenous burlesque troupe, sent two 2Spirit performers (Madame Ode'Min Surprise and Neno Freebird). The proceeds of this event went back to cover the out of town artist fees and travel costs. This event included 5 other local drag performers from Haus of Gore and also the group formally known as the House of Ever Sick.



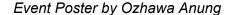

The originator of the name of the group decided to close this chapter of House of Ever Sick - Bawating. The remaining drag performers, volunteers, and organisers decided to change the name of the group to Bawating Babes. Which is still an Indigenous and 2Spirit led drag and burlesque group. When one chapter closes another one begins. Bawating Babes has multiple shows planned for May and June of 2024. Bawating Babes collaborates with local 2Spirit-allied drag performers, but is heavily Indigenous led and culturally aware.

# Typewriters ring in arts week

Click. Clack. National Youth Arts Week is back with typewriters ready to ring in the second annual celebration of young people and the arts.

The opening ceremony, Wednesday at 6:30 p.m. at Circle of Creative Arts, features five typewriters. Guests are invited to type a line or two, or more, of a story before someone else continues tales on four machines. A fifth typewriter is available for open writing.

Arts week co-chairs Christine Campana and Liz Cooke specifically chose the older technology over laptops for the first of seven planned events that run through to May 7.

"With the typewriter you commit to the story," said Cooke.

"Whatever you're typing is out there in the universe and there's no taking it back. It's meant to be challenging, but at the same time because it's partially anonymous you don't have to write your names on the author's list."

The stories will be published in an upcoming issue of Arts Council of Sault Ste. Marie and District's Articulations.

Other planned activities include a photography tour along the waterfront on May 4 at 2 p.m. with shooters Melissa Connors, Dustin Hachey, Amanda James and Mike Nebesniuk.

Just exactly what ground the walk will cover depends on weather, lighting and "the photographers intuition."

"Everybody's encouraged to bring a real camera as opposed to just their cellphone," said Cooke.

Two films will be screened at The Grand Theatre on May 3. Charade, a 1963 release starring screen legends Cary Grant and Audrey Hepburn, is up first at 6 p.m.

A "creative" cult classic, which can't be named in print, follows at 9:30 p.m. It's the only arts week activity with an admission fee. Advance tickets cost \$10 and are on sale at Hilltribe Designs. Door admission is \$15. Photo ID is necessary.

Other events include a cardboard workshop at Art Gallery of Algoma on Thursday at 6 p.m. and a guerilla gardening session at Algoma University on May 6 at 4 p.m.

"We're hoping to inspire youth to participate in the arts and realize the value of the arts to individuals and the community," said Campana.

"We also want youth to realize how many different forms of art are available."

Cooke just handed in her undergraduate thesis at Algoma University on Friday. It's titled Arts and Culture and the Impact on Community Identity Specific to Sault Ste. Marie. The community economic and social development major appreciates the "resiliency" of young artists in the city.

"Older artists in the Sault are already established and they have a good support network," said Cooke.

"Young artists in Sault Ste. Marie, I find, tend to struggle for having validation and a support (group). Yet it never seems to deter them. There is still young artists in Sault Ste. Marie always despite the lack of encouragement."

Maybe there'll be some cheers when a flash mob hits Station Mall on May 7 at 7:45 p.m. to end the week. Public information about such events are usually hush hush, but organizers are pushing that aside "in order to engage as many people as possible and make the community aware," said Cooke.

Seventy-seven communities participated in National Youth Arts Week in 2012. About 22,500 young adults attended 369 events.

# Hachey's found his type

This was one Chicago landmark Dustin Hachey wouldn't miss.

He made a pilgrimage to the Oliver Typewriter Company building when he visited the Windy City in 2011.

The company, formed by Canadian Thomas Oliver, operated from 1895 to 1928.

When you're a fan of typewriters like Hachey, this is a must-see.

Computers, e-mail and desktop publishing have pushed typewriters, once a cornerstone of the business office or a student's desk, off the page.

The Algoma University graduate became serious about collecting the machines when he was 19. He has about 10 in his collection now. Hachey, 25, has sold some and given others to friends "to encourage the love of typing."

He has also loaned out his typewriters to National Youth Arts Week's recent opening event at Circle of Creative Arts and an earlier writing-related activity at Cafe Natura.

"Typing, just like handwriting, is a process of moving forward," said Hachey in an e-mail.

"A hammer smashes ink onto your paper because of your own action. It's about accepting what you've chosen and moving on. Very permanent, like taking a photograph on film it can't be undone easily."

The Sir James Dunn collegiate graduate uses his machines to write letters, make business cards and carbon copies for shipping labels.

"I can just sit and let my ideas flow through me without worrying about form or rule," said Hachey.

Some typewriters were given to him. He's successfully bid on others at auctions. Some machines he seeks out.

"Most people see them as heavy wastes of space I'd imagine," said Hachey.

His favourite is a mint green Royal Futura 800. Royal, another American company, is still in business. Royal Consumer Information Products now sells everything from GPS units and postal scales to shredders and time clocks. But the company still sells five typewriters on its website.

"I think it's important to me because it marks the beginning of my new collection," said Hachey.

"It was the first one which I looked at with more experienced eyes about what the machine is, how it works as a tool, and its complexities and craftsmanship. When you see this, it's really difficult not to respect something so intricate and to then think that someone didn't only design it, but then built it."

Major brand names Underwood, Smith Corona and Olivetti are also represented in his collection. Most are from the 1930s and 1940s. One dates back to 1896. His most recent is from 1979.

"They're mostly in storage, except for the ones I use often," said Hachey.

"They take up a lot of space, and although they're beautiful to look at, it gets kind of cluttered."

All but one of his current roster is a manual machine. An Olympia Electric Report "is a strange hybrid of an electric and a manual typewriter," said Hachey.

"When you switch it on, it kind of makes a throaty whirring like you've just started up an electric engine," he said.

"When you type, it operates like a semi-automatic gun. It has regular hammers, but the electric motor assists them in striking the paper. It's really noisy, but a joy to use."

Hachey has worked on more than a half-dozen films shot in Sault Ste. Marie and Northern Ontario including Compulsion, Swearnet and Cubicle Warriors.

He'll take his Olivetti-Underwood Lettera from 1974 when he is on set.

"Tiny little package – light and good for travel, hasn't failed me yet," said Hachey.

"It's good for writing things in a pinch. If something like a bulletin board has some screen time, and there isn't a printer handy, I could whip up a letter quick."

Hachey is no luddite. He has a BlackBerry, laptop computer and digital camera.

He is also interested in mechanical watches, fountain pens and antique cameras. Hachey is hoping to build a camera this year "if I can find someone to machine some of the parts I need."

"I've got a real fascination with precision mechanical devices, and the skill that went into creating them," he said.

"Our culture's obsession with convenient throwaway machines shows no appreciation for workmanship and has eliminated the need for repair people ... The art of repair is dying out with those who still hold that knowledge. There will be a day when no one knows how to build or maintain these things which were once so common."
