Marie, by way of the Mayor's Office, communicated to Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, then Minister of the Environment Jonathan Wilkinson and Member of Parliament Terry Sheehan our community's interest in establishing the new Canada Water Agency in Sault Ste. Marie. Along with the unique aspects of our community and surrounding area which would make Sault Ste. Marie an ideal location for the agency; and

Whereas the Sault Ste. Marie Canada Water Agency task force has facilitated several broad and inclusive community outreach sessions, gathering input from residents across our region, along with garnering the support of many communities and organizations locally, regionally and internationally; and

Whereas, the Federal Government has announced that in the near term, they will be deciding the location(s) of the agency

Now Therefore Be It Resolved That Mayor Shoemaker be requested to pen a letter to Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, Minister of the Environment and Climate Change Steven Guilbeault, and MP Terry Sheehan reaffirming Sault Ste. Marie's current City Council's support of the establishment of the Canada Water Agency and the unique qualities which make Sault Ste. Marie a superior home for the agency.





## **A More Glorious Future**

### **Inaugural Address**

**Tuesday, November 15, 2022 – 4:30 p.m.**

**(Council Chambers)**

- Madame Clerk, CAO White, newly elected Councillors and my fellow Saultites, welcome, annii, bienvenue and bongiorno at tutti.
- It is my honour to be here with you tonight. I want to begin by recognizing former Mayors Butland, Amaroso and Provenzano who I am humbled to have here with us, and I want to thank each of them for the service they gave to our community, and for working to improve our community during their terms in this chair.
- We have some of our neighbouring friends here today and some who couldn't be here, but who I hope to meet with very soon. COVID strained our ability to meet face to face, but I hope that we can recommit to the friendships we have developed over the last many years, and find ways to help develop closer ties that can benefit all of our residents. I do want to recognize that the Historic Sault Ste. Marie Métis Council is represented here today by Sherri Smale.

- La mia storia e una storia tipica de gli gienti di Sault Ste. Marie. La mia mama, Franca Coccimiglio, e nata in Calabria n'e una famiglia di 11 figli. Quando lei aveva 17 anni, lei e venuta a Sault Ste. Marie senza parlare n'e anche una parola di inglese.
- My mother was born in Calabria and moved to Sault Ste. Marie without her parents at age 17, and without the benefit of speaking a word of English. She came to the Soo looking for opportunity after the lingering effects of World War II on Italy's economy and society, even decades after the end of the war. The opportunity she pursued was here in Sault Ste. Marie, with its large Italian community, and in which 4 of her 11 siblings had made better lives for their families.

- My dad, Greg, has a different cultural story but one that lands him in the same welcoming community as my mom. The son of an active Canadian army member, my dad's family moved from army base to army base in his early years. Spending time in barracks across the country, and even a few years posted in Germany while my grandfather provided Canada's assistance to the German post-war reconstruction. After completing his secondary education, my dad, whose family had by then settled in southwestern Ontario, looked north for opportunity. He found his opportunity at Sault College, and thereafter in a job at St. Mary's Paper.
- While working at the paper mill, he worked alongside my zio Alfredo and zio Michele Coccimiglio who introduced my parents, which is where my story begins. Despite being from different continents, and different cultures, they were both hard workers who found a community where they could better themselves and establish roots.

- They were married and had 3 children, my brother, Steven, my sister, Nadia, and myself. As I noted at last week's city council meeting, I was born on municipal election day in 1988, 34 years ago yesterday. My mom jokes that the nurse asked her whether she had voted before heading into the delivery room.
- Pour nous donner l'opportunit  qu'ils n'ont pas eu, mes parents ont inscrit mon frere, ma soeur et moi dans une  cole francaise, dans une  poque ou le bilinguisme n'etait pas tres commun. J'ai completer mon education primaire en francais ainsi que mon diplome d'etude secondaire a St. Mary's College. After my French elementary education and my high school years at St. Mary's College, I attended Algoma University for my undergraduate.
- I left Sault Ste. Marie for law school and lived in Ottawa for my graduate studies. For a young adult interested in politics, Ottawa had more appeal than I could have asked for. But while the appeal of Canada's capital was great, there was an even greater draw to return to my home community.

- I went to Ottawa to learn the law, but came back from Ottawa having learned that Sault Ste. Marie was where I belonged. In quick succession after my return home, I began working at Wishart Law Firm, where I work to this day, and successfully ran for City Council in Ward 3. Most importantly, during the last decade I've been home, I married my beautiful wife, Jenna, and we had two boys who we cherish, Hudson and Maxwell. While I took you through the history of my story, and why I felt the sense of community I do, for me there is no greater motivator in wanting to build the city I know we can be - than Hudson and Max. I hope that, when they tell their story in the future, they can look upon these years and be proud of the work that we did to improve our city for their future, and the future of all of our residents.
- I ran for Mayor because, after what I consider 8 successful years as a Councillor, I still had more to give to my community, and I am so grateful to the community for having entrusted me with its support. The next 4 years will challenge us all, but in tackling these challenges, we can capitalize on the opportunities they present, in the same way that in years past, people came to Sault Ste. Marie to take advantage of the opportunities that were here.

- The challenges are known to us, but the solutions will be for this council to work through.
- We are facing an opioid epidemic that has taken the lives of too many of our residents and is hampering our city's efforts to re-develop its downtown. While healthcare operations cannot be funded by the city, we can, and in my opinion, must, provide funding for the capital needs of a supervised consumption site. Before putting municipal dollars into any supervised consumption site, we need a commitment from MPP Romano and MP Sheehan that they'll be there to give our city the approvals we need for our residents to get the services that are available to residents in other northern Ontario municipalities. Within the last week, I have met with both MP Sheehan and MPP Romano and they know that they will have an unrelenting advocate for Sault Ste. Marie's needs in the Mayor's chair.

- Our community's needs are so intertwined. We need jobs for people to fill, but workers need houses, their roads need plowed in the winter, their potholes filled in spring, their kids need parks, museums, rinks and cultural attractions, they need police to keep the community safe. On all of those fronts, there is a role for the municipality, and an opportunity for this City Council to better our community.
- On policing, our station is pushing 60 years old and doesn't meet today's accessibility standards. It's also in a location that provides no ancillary benefits to the community. If we are going to renew our police services building, it should be, or at least some of it should be, in the downtown area where so much positive value can be realized by having our officers integrated in the heart of our community.

- On parks and recreation, we should explore how we get more people using our existing assets, by adding additional services to places like Bellevue Park. A beach area for sport and relaxation could be a great draw in the heart of our city for people who can't make it out to Pointe Des Chenes for the day.
- We have services that are beloved in our community, like the Hub Trail which is now pushing 20 years since it was first developed. It has been expanded since that time, and it's great for residents who live in the P Patch, or Fort Creek, or along Queen Street and Shannon Road, but not so great if you are in Buckley and Bayview. Our west end is underserved by the Hub Trail and expanding it westward is a goal I share with many around this chamber.
- Finally, we will all be challenged by climate change and environmental concerns. Again, these challenges present an opportunity to be seized. As the Alternative Energy Capital of North America, we can work to reduce the City's carbon footprint, while at the same time reducing our fuel consumption and our vehicle maintenance costs.

- We can and should continue to use our PUC to partner with industry to help not only the PUC's bottom line, but to also help reduce the carbon emissions in our community at large.
- To my peers at the Council table, I am so glad to have the opportunity to serve with you over the coming four years. I will work hard to earn and keep your trust, and I humbly ask for the favour of your patience as I continue to learn and grow within my new role.
- I look forward to supporting your ideas, and moving forward on an agenda that will benefit our city and its residents both in the short term and the long term. My public commitments have been clear, we need growth, and we need development, but we also need to achieve this in a managed and prudent way. I will work with each of you to give the residents the community they want and deserve, but in a responsible manner that will show respect and awareness for the cost of living concerns of our constituents. With the capable support and guidance of our dedicated City staff, I know there is much that we as a body will be able to accomplish.

- Our city was built by people who, as I described earlier in my remarks, came to Sault Ste. Marie because they saw opportunity here. Today and for the next 4 years, this chamber will be looked upon to provide, or in some cases, create, that opportunity for the next generation of immigrants and residents.
- Now no speech of mine would be complete without a reference to our history, and especially to one of my favorite historical figures, Sir William H. Hearst. Hearst was, of course, the former Premier of Ontario and Sault Ste. Marie MPP. Premier Hearst, in rallying his province 105 years ago spoke words that fit today's circumstances perfectly, and so I use them today as a call to action for all of us.
- He said: We are living in our greatest day, but we feel there is a still more glorious future.
- Let you and me do our part, and bear our burden, whatever it may be, willingly, and with a stout heart to achieve that more glorious future.

- Council, staff, and citizens: this city that we love and call home is at the edge of history once more.
- Now it's up to us to get to work on that more glorious future.



# Sault Ste Marie Hybrid Facility Starwood Energy Group

November 2022



# Overview

SEG

SSM Hybrid is a hybrid solar and storage facility (the “Project”) being developed by Starwood Energy Group (“SEG”) in Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario. The facility as currently configured consists of +/- 1100 acres containing 300 MW of solar generation along with 600 MWh of battery energy storage. The ultimate nameplate size of the facility will be driven primarily by negotiated off-take agreements and the amount of available land.

SSM Hybrid is being put forward as part of the IESO’s Long Term 1 RFP. Through the RFP the IESO is presenting a system needs-based approach to provide new capacity to meet Ontario’s future energy requirements.

# Overview (cont.)

SEG

As part of the IESO's LT1 procurement process, SEG is seeking a letter of support from the city of Sault Ste Marie for the Project.

The project currently has the support of PUC Inc. and First Nations.

The City of Sault Ste Marie is recognized as a leader in providing clean energy solutions for northern Ontario. SEG looks forward to working with the city and believes that the SSM Hybrid facility can play an important role in providing much needed local capacity to service the growing needs of Sault Ste Marie's industrial customers.

# SSM Hybrid Facility Connection

SEG

The Facility will be located at a site south of Base Line road in the vicinity of the Sault Ste. Marie airport in Sault Ste Marie, Ontario.

A single transmission line will run approximately 7km to the point of interconnection with the PUC Transmission 230kV Station at the east end of Yates Avenue.

Several routes for the connection are currently under consideration.

Consultations with community stakeholders will be part of the evaluation process for the final connection route.

# Current Status

- Starwood Energy Group has been accepted as a ‘qualified’ participant in the IESO’s LT1 Expedited procurement program
- The SSM Hybrid project will be submitted as part of the IESO’s Expedited LT1 RFP, with submission currently expected in December 2022

It was great to connect with you both on Friday November 18, 2022. Thank you for making the time for me. It is obvious from our meeting that I need not reiterate the severity of the addictions crisis afflicting our city. I appreciate the effort both of you are making to secure funding for programming to assist with this issue.

Of particular importance to the municipality is the need for a return of the Concurrent Disorders Intensive Day Treatment program (the "Day Treatment Program") that was run as a pilot program at Sault Area Hospital ("SAH") but subsequently not funded on a permanent basis.

As I understand, Sault Area Hospital has applied for funding for the Day Treatment Program from Ontario Health, but a final decision has not yet been confirmed.

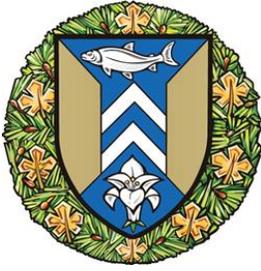



**PURPOSE**

To provide an update on the Best for Kids Transit Pilot Project and seek Council's approval to implement this summer service on a permanent basis.

**BACKGROUND**

At a Council meeting dated February 3, 2020 the following resolution was passed.

Best for Kids Transit Pilot Project

Whereas it is the objective of The Best For Kids Committee "to encourage and promote the City of Sault Ste, Marie's efforts to put children first"; and

Whereas it is the Committee's vision "that Sault Ste. Marie will be a community that puts children first by understanding and investing in healthy childhood development to improve outcomes for all children"; and

Whereas the City and the Committee are committed to fostering a community that has an extraordinary quality of life for children and their families; and

Whereas the City of Sault Ste. Marie has many opportunities for children to be involved in recreational activities such as the Splash Pad, the Pump Track, the Manzo Pool, the Greco Pool, and the Skateboard Park; and  
Whereas all of these recreational opportunities are important in the development of healthy children and their quality of life; and

Whereas it may be difficult for some children to access any of these recreational opportunities because of lack of transportation or its affordability;

Now Therefore Be It Resolved that Community Development and Enterprise Services be requested to investigate the feasibility of a pilot project to run from June 27, 2020 to September 6, 2020, whereby Transit Services would provide free bus rides on weekends to all children and their parents who would like to attend any of the recreational facilities listed above and report back to Council.

At a Council meeting dated March 9, 2020 the following resolution was passed.

Resolved that the report of the Director of Community Services dated 2020 03 09 concerning Best for Kids Transit Pilot Project be accepted and that a pilot project to provide free Transit for a responsible adult to accompany children to access the Splash Pad, Pump Track, Manzo Pool, Greco Pool and Skateboard Park between June 27, 2020 and September 6, 2020 be approved and results reported back to Council.

Furthermore at a Council meeting dated October 13, 2020 the following resolution as amended was passed.

Resolved that the report of the Director of Community Services dated 2020 10 13 be received and that in order to collect more data the Best for Kids Transit program be extended for two years with the program to commence the last weekend in June 2021 to the day after Labour Day in September 2021 and again commencing the last weekend of June 2022 to the day after Labour Day in September 2022 and report back to Council.

### **ANALYSIS**

The pilot was scheduled to run from June 27 through to Sept 6, 2020. As a result of COVID-19, transit fare collection was forgone between March 19, 2020 to July 13, 2020 thus creating a delay to the true start date of the pilot and no statistics between June 27 to July 13, 2020.

In addition, ridership during 2020 was below 50% of historical ridership as indicated in the table due to Covid-19. Therefore, Council extended the pilot for two (2) years ending in September 2022. Ridership has since trended upward in 2022.

The ridership for this pilot has been low based on Operator feedback and the data Transit was able to collect. The data states 615 adults took advantage of this initiative with an average of two (2) children with them for each ride. The tracking of ridership specific to the initiative has been challenging given COVID impact in conjunction with using the older farebox technology which relies on pushing a button manually (in process of being fully upgraded). It is also highly likely that there were rides to the locations from pass users participating in the Social Services pass program thus contributing to lower requirements for free transit service to the identified locations.

Although usage has been low, the initiative supports the idea that transit is open to the whole community and further supports individuals that have barriers in accessing community facilities. The initiative promotes utilizing outdoor spaces leading to a healthy, active living lifestyle.

Ongoing benefits are as follows:

- Ease access for families to the city facilities that they may otherwise not be able to access
- Provide recreational activities to children which is important for healthy development
- Improve the quality of life for these families

The process entails a passenger with a child or children boarding the bus, and stating where they are heading. The Operator does not charge the family member(s) accompanying and keys in the appropriate number of individuals boarding the bus.

The program services the areas noted below.

- o Splash Pad
- o John Rhodes Community Centre Pool
- o Skateboard Track
- o Pump Track
- o Manzo Pool
- o Greco Pool

City staff are recommending that this service be implemented permanently as there is little impact to forgone revenue but does provide accessibility to recreational services for families during summer months who may not be able to visit them otherwise.

### **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

The financial impact to Transit operations were nominal given the number of participants for the pilot. It is anticipated that implementing this services annually for the summer months will not have a significant impact on forgone revenue

(approximately \$1,800 since pilot inception 2020) and can be accommodated easily within the existing budget.

### **STRATEGIC PLAN / POLICY IMPACT**

The recommendation supports the focus area of the Community Strategic Plan for 2021-2024 in a number of ways.

- Within the Service Delivery focus area, it continues to assist in delivering excellent customer service to citizens.
- Additionally it supports the focus area of infrastructure, as it will assist in Maintaining Existing Infrastructure.
- Under Quality of Life area the action promotes Quality of Life Advantages.
- Community Development & Partnerships, it creates Social and Economic Activity.

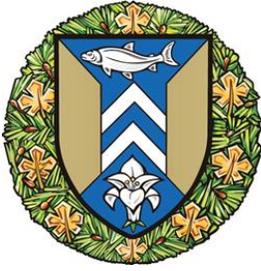
### **RECOMMENDATION**

**Purpose**

This report has been prepared to seek Council's approval to amend the lease for the final year (4th) of the contract with the District of Sault Ste. Marie Social Services Administration Board (Social Services) for flat fee service.

**Background**

At the Council meeting dated January 28, 2019 a report to enter into a one (1) year pilot with a four (4) year extension was received by Council supported by the following By-law:

**By-law 2019-15 (Agreement) Transit Pass Partnership**

Resolved that By-law 2019-15 being a by-law to authorize the execution of the Agreement between the City and The Sault Ste. Marie District Social Services Administration Board for a one (1) year pilot for a "flat fee for service" for transit services be passed in open Council this 28th day of January, 2019.

Social Services has had a relationship with the City to provide Transit service for over twenty (20) years. Under the previous model, Social Services determined on a case-by-case basis who qualified for a Transit pass, provided funds directly to program recipients, who then in turn purchased a pass from the Transit Department. This approach posed a risk for Social Services and diverted potential revenue from the Transit Services Division. The previous process of issuing clients' funds to purchase their own passes involved a great deal of administrative work for both Transit and Social Services. Social Services has historically expensed approximately \$500,000 annually on public transportation for people who have employment and/or medical related transportation needs. This translated to approximately 7,500 passes annually or 625 people each month. There were approximately 2,500 people receiving Social Assistance that did not have their own vehicle and require public transportation.

Under the new model, the process is easier to administer for staff at Social Services and Transit, while allowing Social Services to provide quick and efficient client services to the Ontario Works recipients when they present in the Social Services office and ensures payment flows to the City.

A 92-day bus pass was created which is procured by Transit Services and supplied to the Social Services to administer on a case-by-case process. Procurement costs were covered in full by the Social Services as part of the arrangement.

**Current Process:**

1. Monthly passes are provided by Transit Services to Social Services for Administration to the equivalent of the prior 92 day pass.
2. Client presents at front desk of Social Services requesting a bus pass.
3. Social Services staff reviews client file to ensure eligibility.
4. Social Services provides individual with the buss pass and is advised at this time that lost or stolen bus passes will not be replaced.

Furthermore at a Council meeting dated November 4, 2019 the following resolution was passed.

Resolved that By-law 2019-218 being a by-law to authorize the execution of the Agreement between the City and The Sault Ste. Marie District Social Services Administration Board to extend the existing lease agreement for a "flat fee for service" for transit services be passed in open Council this 4th day of November, 2019.

**Analysis**

The partnership with Social Services has been very successful leading to an estimated 300,000 rides under the new model since 2019. It should be noted that several of the passengers were existing Transit passengers, however this partnership did introduce new users to our Transit system.

Social Services recently contacted Transit Services to notify the City that their employment services funding model will be revised in 2024, they are implementing strategic services reductions in 2023 (Appendix A) and that senior management will be recommending funding for Transit passes be reduced from \$400,000 to \$300,000 annually in 2023. Social Services also believes that transit funding will cease in 2024 as a result of the planned funding change.

Social Services advised that remaining funding can support an amount of \$300,000 to complete the final year of the agreement expiring December 31, 2023. This is a reduction of \$100,000 from the \$400,000 from the existing agreement.

Highlights of the partnership include:

1. Ridership of 1,894,611 in 2019 versus 1,517,014 in 2018. That is an increase of 377,597 year over year. The Social Services partnership contributed to this increase as more clients were able to access this service on a regular basis.
2. Decrease in administration work for both Social Services and Transit Services.
3. There has been a decrease in the annual costs for Social Services in relation to costs associated with issuing of bus passes.
4. Past survey results (two in total) conducted by Social Services with the bus pass users have indicated the service has helped them get around the City, attend appointments, community events, recreational activities, visit family & friends, grocery stores, go to and from work and attend employment agencies.
5. 100% of respondents indicated having a bus pass improves their ability to accomplish daily tasks and responsibilities.

The results demonstrate that Ontario Works recipients are benefitting from receiving passes through this partnership. The service level will remain the same and the dollars remaining at \$300,000 will still cover off the ridership based on historical levels. Transit Services monitors the program in partnership with Social Services staff.

City staff continue to support the partnership and are recommending support of the amendment providing continued service to Social Services until December 31, 2023. Social Services will connect with Transit Services after their funding model is finalized next year to explore any future partnership model that may be possible moving forward. Transportation barriers pose a significant issue for those living with limited income and this partnership provides a barrier free design for these purposes. The partnership guarantees a significant revenue stream to the Municipality while providing access to individuals who require the service. In addition, Transit ridership has grown which contributes to the Municipality sharing in additional funds from Gas Tax Funding.

### **Financial Implications**

The amending agreement will see the City receive \$100,000 less in year four (4) of the agreement. The agreement to date up to including 2022 has generated \$1,200,000 in revenue for Transit Services. The agreement will be effective January 1, 2023 and will have the following payment schedule:

1. SOCIAL SERVICES agrees to pay to the City \$400,000 in exchange for the Transit passes with the following payment schedule:
  - a. February 1, 2020 \$400,000;
  - b. February 1, 2021 \$400,000;
  - c. February 1, 2022 \$400,000;
  - d. February 1, 2023 \$400,000 reduce to \$300,000

2. The City will procure and provide passes to Social Services to administer.

Social Services has confirmed that will continue to distribute the passes and will cover all costs of new cards, based on actual costs incurred by the City. Operating revenue will be adjusted downwards accordingly for the 2023 budget.

**Strategic Plan / Policy Impact**

The recommendation supports the focus area of the Community Strategic Plan for 2021-2024 in a number of ways.

- Within the Service Delivery focus area, it continues to assist in delivering excellent customer service to citizens. Specifically, in fostering a positive avenue for individuals who are currently working by in receipt of social assistance or who are in search of employment and require access to public transportation.
- It supports the Community Development and Partnership focus of Maximizing Economic Development & Investment with the commitment to maintain financial viability.
- Furthermore, it exemplifies communication and stakeholder consultation to create an environment that encourages engagement and the exploration of mutual goals to grow our community. Collaboration with community partners and stakeholders is essential to our success.
- Supports the Future SSM Social Equity pillar where Sault Ste. Marie will be a welcoming and inclusive community where everyone is valued and respected, has access to an acceptable standard of living, can fully engage and participate in all aspects of community life and is able to realize their full potential.

**Recommendation**

It is therefore recommended that Council take the following action:

Resolved that the report of the Director of Community Services dated November 21, 2022 be received.

An amending agreement and by-law 2022-181 authorizing signature of the agreement appears elsewhere on the Council agenda for approval.

**RE: Social Assistance Bus Fare**

Dear Mr. Lamming:

As you are aware, the District of Sault Ste. Marie Social Services Administration Board (Social Services) has been working in partnership with the City of Sault Ste. Marie since early 2019 in order to provide transit services to people in receipt of Ontario Works. This model has been widely utilized by community members and we have received significant positive feedback in regard to its benefits specific to finding and maintaining employment and/or attending medical appointments. As you may also recall, when we began to explore this model in late 2018, Social Services stated it would continue to support this innovative transit strategy, subject to provincial funding allocations.

In 2019 Ontario communicated that it was strategically transforming its employment service model across the province. In August of that year the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities began transforming Ontario's employment services with the vision to make them more efficient, streamlined, and outcome focused. As part of Employment Services Transformation, a new service delivery model is integrating social assistance employment services, as well as other government employment services, into Employment Ontario. This transformation has been occurring in southern Ontario over the past two years and is scheduled to begin in northern Ontario in 2024.

Transferring Ontario Works employment services to Employment Ontario will result in the loss of provincial employment funding within Social Services. As this occurs we will no longer have the ability to provide block transit funding to the City as we have done

since 2019. Rather than simply eliminate employment services due to funding changes in 2024, the Social Services Senior Management Team will be recommending to the DSSMSSAB Board that we wind down our employment services strategically and responsibly to mitigate the impact that will be experienced by the community.


With this end in mind, we will be recommending to the Board that we reduce the transit block funding from \$400,000 to \$300,000 annually in 2023 (January – December). Based on current information available, unfortunately we also believe Social Services will not have the internal financial resources to support our transit partnership past 2023.

I fully realize this may have impacts on the number of riders that can be accommodated and supported through our current transit ridership model next calendar year and commit to working with you and your team to identify the number of riders that can be supported in 2023 through this reduced funding allocation.

Please note that we will not be making this recommendation to the Board based on any negative service or employment outcomes; it is based solely on significant changes to our current employment funding allocation from the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services.

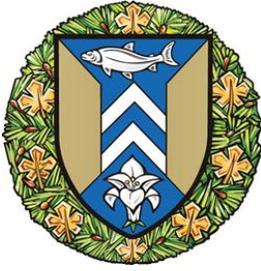

**Purpose**

The purpose of this report is to seek approval for the full time equivalent complement required at the recently expanded Northern Community Centre (twin pad arena addition).

**Background**

At a Council meeting dated October 26, 2020 there was a presentation by Integrated Design Engineering + Architecture (IDEA). The purpose of the presentation was to provide an update on scope, design and costs for the expanded facility. Staff did not anticipate an increase in the operating budget for the project.

Furthermore, at a Council meeting dated May 31, 2021 the Hon. Laurie Scott, Minister of Infrastructure and Hon. Ross Romano, Minister of Training, Colleges and Universities were in attendance by video. They were present to announce grant funding in the amount of \$18,332,097 towards the \$32,809,500 project. The support was made possible through the Strategic Priorities Infrastructure Fund.

The \$32,809,500 project cost included the option to add the Walking Track with Bowl Windows.

**Analysis**

Construction on the expanded Twin Pad Arena is presently over 75 percent complete. To operate the facility, Staff require additional complement to meet the needs of the expanded facility (additional ice surface and amenities to clean including walking track, change rooms, multi use rooms, etc.). City Council is required to authorize an increase to the complement of staff.

There will be additional revenue from ice rental and there will be efficiencies given that the twin pad arena and existing Northern Community Centre (NCC) will be combined into one. Staffing requirements can be closely linked to the existing John Rhodes Community Centre (JRCC) where an existing twin pad and pool is present

with supporting amenities. The table below provides a breakdown of what is being requested:

The net operating annual increase for the facility being requested is \$47,574. Since the initial forecast, there has been inflationary pressure that has impacted expense categories. When combining this increase with the existing McMeeken and NCC budgets it totals \$304,721 (McMeeken \$210,974 + Increase Request \$47,574 + NCC \$46,173). The projected deficit is much lower than that of the JRCC, which was \$1,806,583 for 2022 and \$761,981 to operate the GFL Memorial Gardens.

The newly expanded NCC will have the same amount of Operators and Supervision as the JRCC. However, it will have four (4) fewer PT Rink Attendants as Management will look to combine the resources for both facilities to create improved efficiency.

Staff have been able to limit the impact of the increase as there will be increased rental revenue from the additional ice surface and food and beverage sales have been budgeted at a higher amount. The canteen will be open on the lower level of the facility servicing both sides. In addition, the plan is to serve food and beverage on the second level designated area (kitchenette) for Sault College Cougar games and events that are more substantial. The partnerships with Algoma District School Board and the Pro Shop will also have a positive impact from a revenue generating perspective.

Staff will closely monitor Operating performance in year one (1), which will provide a good basis for future planning.

### **Financial Implications**

There will be an annual increase of \$47,574 to the Operating Budget as a result of this request.

### **Strategic Plan / Policy Impact**

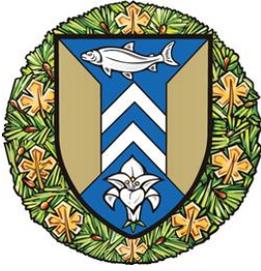

**Purpose**

To seek Council approval to reallocate approved project contingency funding to construction contingency for the expanded Twin Pad Arena project.

**Background**

The Twin Pad project was approved in the amount of \$32,809,500 broken down in the following categories.

Category	Amount
Architectural & Engineering	\$1,648,431
Construction	\$29,319,000
Contingency	\$1,305,031
Furniture/Finishing/Equipment/Environmental	\$537,038
Total	\$32,809,500

The construction tender to Ellis Don was approved on May 31, 2021 in the amount of \$29,319,000. The increase being requested is for the construction contract.

Further, at a Council meeting dated August 8, 2022 the following resolution was passed.

Resolved that the report of the Deputy CAO Community Development and Enterprise Services dated August 8, 2022 concerning Twin Pad Expansion Update be received and that the recommendation of the Twin Pad Task Force for a change order in the amount of \$142,383 for rubberized surfacing of the walking track be approved from contingency funding.

To accommodate anticipated change orders that are within the approved project budget, staff require Council authorization to move funds from project contingency to construction contingency.

### **Analysis**

As part of any large-scale construction, project change orders arise during the build process and supports why projected contingency is allocated at the onset. In alignment with the Procurement Policy, each change order is evaluated on its merit and recommended in the best interests of the City as the owner of this project. As at November 17, 2022 available project contingency funding remains at \$775,488 from the original \$1,305,031 approved amount.

Staff are recommending that \$500,000 be reallocated from Project Contingency to Construction Contingency to cover anticipated change orders to carry the project to substantial completion, which is anticipated in late January 2023.

### **Financial Implications**

The increase to the construction contract tender in the amount of \$500,000 can be accommodated within the remaining project contingency. This is in alignment with the Procurement Policy section 7(3) relating to change orders to approved contracts.

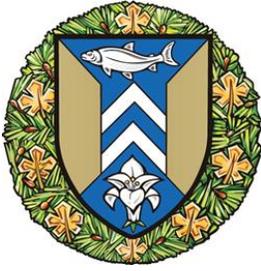

**Purpose**

The purpose of this report is to seek Council's approval for recommendations from the Environmental Sustainability Committee for the distribution of Community Development Fund (CDF) – Green Initiatives Program funds.

**Background**

The purpose of the Green Initiatives Program of the Community Development Fund (CDF) is to support green initiatives that result in reduced greenhouse gas emissions (GHGs), improve water quality/rehabilitation or increase energy efficiency. The City of Sault Ste. Marie's (the City) Environmental Sustainability Committee (ESC) is responsible for making recommendations for the allocation of funds for eligible projects or programs that support the City's environment plans and practices. Funding applications are reviewed by the ESC in accordance with the CDF – Green Initiatives Program guidelines and are accepted on a rolling intake throughout the year. Total annual funds available for all projects under the CDF – Green Initiatives Program in 2022 is \$50,000. Eligible applicants include non-profit organizations and City departments.

The following project was presented to the ESC on October 13, 2022. The committee passed the following resolution:

Resolved that the Environmental Sustainability Committee supports the request for funding from the CDF – Green Initiatives stream in the amount of \$1,388.20 for the Algoma Rod and Gun Club LED Lighting Upgrade project and recommends that Council approve the request.

**Analysis**

**Algoma Rod and Gun Club LED Lighting Project**

The Algoma Rod and Gun Club (ARGC) aims to increase energy efficiency of the main club house, 200 metre range and garage lighting by replacing the current ballasts with newer and more energy efficient LED fixtures. An assessment under

the IESO's Save on Energy Small Business Lighting program was completed on the ARGC buildings. This is an energy efficiency project and is expected to reduce energy consumption by 12,680.28 kilowatt hours (kwh) which equates to a 62.26 % reduction from current lighting usage, and will result in an estimated \$1,521.63 in annual energy savings. Funding for part of the project is being covered by the Provincial Small Business Lighting Program; however, total projects costs exceed program funding. As such this project seeks to acquire funding from the Green Initiatives Fund to complete the full building lighting retrofit. This retrofit will contribute to the energy efficiency objective under the buildings and energy - community pillar of the Sault Ste. Marie Community Greenhouse Gas Reduction Plan 2020 – 2030, which encourages the completion of energy efficiency retrofit. The project supports the Green Initiatives Program fund pillar of energy efficiency.

### **Financial Implications**

The requests for \$1,388.20 for the Algoma Rod and Gun Club LED Lighting Project can be accommodated within the 2022 CDF-Green Initiatives funds uncommitted balance which is \$2,166 after the approval of the City Deep Energy Retrofit Feasibility Study Projects approved elsewhere on the agenda. By the end of the year, any remaining funds not used must go towards the purchase of trees for the subsequent year, which trees should be planted in City Parks or on City property by Public Works employees as per a resolution from the March 9, 2020 Council Meeting.

### **Strategic Plan / Policy Impact**

The recommendation supports value and focus areas of the Community Strategic Plan for 2021 – 2024 through:

- **Environmental Stewardship:** We will use resources wisely to maintain and create a sustainable city for future generations

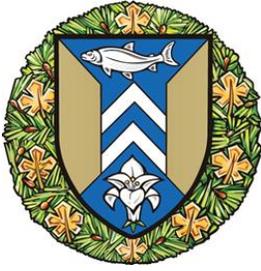

**Purpose**

The purpose of this report is to seek Council approval to apply to the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) Green Municipal Fund (GMF) GHG Reduction Pathway Feasibility Study program for funding to complete deep energy retrofit (DER) audits on the City of Sault Ste. Marie's (the City's) top six (6) GHG emitting facilities to identify projects that will integrate energy and GHG reductions into their longer-term plans for managing community buildings and achieving net-zero emissions by 2050.

**Background**

On December 14, 2020, the City of Sault Ste. Marie (the City) unanimously approved the *Sault Ste. Marie Community Greenhouse Gas (GHG) Reduction Plan 2020 – 2030* (the plan). The City's plan includes a long-term target for GHG reduction of net zero by 2050. In order to meet this target, significant action from all community stakeholders, including key actions from the City will be required. One of the corporate energy actions in the plan recommends establishing an implementation plan for retrofits of existing City buildings and updating outdated energy audits, or conducting new ones for assets that have yet to be audited. The FCM grant is designed to help municipalities integrate energy and GHG reductions into their longer-term plans for managing community buildings. Municipalities are only eligible to apply once and are encouraged to apply for a portfolio of buildings.

The FCM grant will fund 80% of project costs, up to \$200,000 for a portfolio of buildings. City staff submitted an application to the Environmental Sustainability Committee (ESC) approve the allocation of the remaining 20% of project costs from the CDF Green Initiatives Fund to cover the City's share so that they can move forward with the application to the FCM. The request was approved at the October 13, 2022 ESC meeting with the following resolution:

Resolved that the Environmental Sustainability Committee supports the request for funding from the CDF – Green Initiatives stream in the amount of \$50,000 for

the City of Sault Ste. Marie Deep Energy Retrofit Feasibility Study project and recommends that Council approve the request.

**Analysis**

The DER audits will enable the City to identify a sequence of GHG reduction measures to reduce GHG emissions for a portfolio of the top six (6) emitters of community buildings (based on the 2017 greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions inventory, including:

The DER feasibility studies will help determine the level of effort, resources and technologies required to bring project facilities to a low carbon and energy use performance, based on three scenarios; including: a) 50% reduction within 10 years, b) 80% reductions within 20 years; and, c) net zero carbon by 2050, as compared to the 2017 emissions baseline. To meet its net zero target, the City needs a roadmap so that it can double down on its efforts to reduce its impact on climate change. The DER feasibility studies will allow the City to go beyond the standard energy conservation measures it has taken in the past to tackle energy use in existing buildings<sup>1</sup>. Deep energy retrofits are a multi-measure energy efficiency retrofit that achieves at least 40% energy savings<sup>2</sup>. They can help with reducing asset maintenance costs and future energy expenditures on new energy generation as the City grows. The DER audits will provide the City with the information required to plan a portfolio-wide approach for energy efficiency and help with planning for and future capital projects, including grant applications.

**Financial Implications**

The cost for completing six (6) DER audits on City facilities has been estimated at \$250,000. The FCM will fund 80% of project costs, and the remaining 20% (\$50,000) can be accommodated from the City’s Community Development Fund (CDF) Green Initiatives Program uncommitted balance of \$52,166.

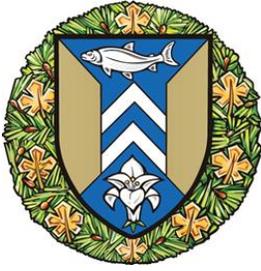

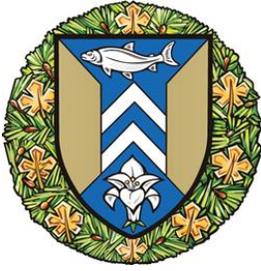

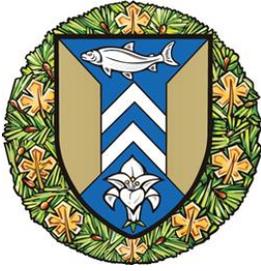

**Purpose**

To designate Carmen’s Way resurfacing between Queen Street West and Second Line East as the candidate project for the 2023 Connecting Link Program funding application.

**Background**

Connecting links are municipal roads that connect two ends of a provincial highway through a community or to an international or interprovincial border crossing. Municipalities with connecting link roads can apply for funding for up to 90% of total eligible project costs up to a maximum of \$3 million per road project.

**Analysis**

Carmen’s Way is the City’s next connecting link priority to be resurfaced. In the City’s Asset Management Plan for Roads and Bridges, the pavement condition is scored by assigning a Pavement Condition Index (PCI) which is a score out of 100. PCI scores for Carmen’s Way are the lowest of any connecting link road in the City.

**Financial Implications**

While there is no immediate financial implication to this report, successful applicants will receive up to 90% of total eligible project costs up to a maximum of \$3 million per road project.

Resurfacing of roads is linked to the infrastructure focus area of the corporate strategic plan.

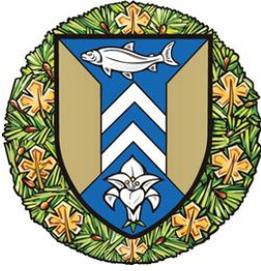

### **Purpose**

The purpose of the report is to request Council approval to proceed with construction administration services related to upgrades at the West End Sewage Treatment Plant, and work related to effluent pump replacement.

### **Background**

The West End Sewage Treatment Plant Phase I upgrade contract was approved at the June 8, 2020 Council meeting.

At the August 9, 2021 meeting additional work was approved in relation to effluent pump replacement.

### **Analysis**

AECOM Canada Ltd. is providing engineering services for the design and construction administration of the West End Sewage Treatment Plant Phase I upgrades, and Maple Reinders Constructors Ltd. are constructing the work. During the course of work, additional effort was required to address unforeseen issues as they arose, some of which related to code non-compliance issues discovered at the site. As a result, construction for the Phase I upgrades will be extended and additional construction administration services are required.

In addition to the above noted work, work has proceeded in relation to the effluent pump design as approved at the August 9, 2021 meeting. It was anticipated that combining the effluent pump work with the current West End Plant Phase I contract would achieve efficiencies, given that a contractor was already mobilized at the site. However, based on several factors, including a long lead associated with pump supply, separate mobilization and demobilization costs were required. Therefore, it is now recommended to proceed to an open tender, to solicit competitive quotations for the work.

The existing approved engineering fee for the West End Sewage Treatment Plant upgrades, is approximately \$4,760,000, excluding HST. The additional fee of approximately \$490,000, would increase the total engineering fee to approximately \$5,250,000, excluding HST. AECOM is recommended for the engineering work based on Clause 22(3)(a) and (f) in the procurement bylaw, namely standardization of services, and purchase in the best interests of the City. While accounting for existing approvals, the total budget to date is approximately \$37.6 million, which is within the allocated West End Phase I total approved budget, with funding from Sanitary Sewer Revenues.

Estimated construction costs for the effluent pumps will be included in the 2023 Capital Budget for review and approval. Tendering for this work will take place after 2023 Budget approval.

AECOM's report related to the construction administration services, and the effluent pump work has been attached for Council's information.

### **Financial Implications**

When recoverable HST is removed and allowances for engineering are added to existing approvals, the City's cost is estimated to be approximately \$37.6 million which is within the original budget with funding from Sanitary Sewer Revenues. A report will be brought forward at a future council meeting regarding the effluent pump work to be tendered as a separate project.

### **Strategic Plan / Policy Impact**

The report links to the Strategic Plan focus area of Infrastructure, and specifically maintaining existing infrastructure.

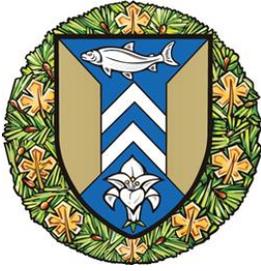

**PURPOSE**

The purpose of this report is to seek the direction of Council regarding the Finance Committee Terms of Reference.

**BACKGROUND**

On November 15, 2021 Council received the report of the Deputy City Clerk concerning the Boards and Committees Review 2021. Council directed the Finance Committee to review its terms of reference and bring back options for Council's consideration.

The following motion was approved by the Finance Committee on March 9, 2022 with the recommendation was approved by Council On April 11, 2022:

Whereas the Finance Committee has reviewed their Terms of Reference as directed by Council November 15, 2021 and discussed options regarding the structure and purpose of the committee, the Committee now directs the Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer to report to Council the recommendation that a decision be referred to the next Council and that the current Terms of Reference continue until the end of the current term of Council.

**ANALYSIS**

The Finance Committee reviewed several other municipalities to determine if a Finance Committee existed and if so what the purpose and structure was. Several options for the Finance Committee were discussed:

- Status Quo
- Move to an Audit Committee Only

- Dissolve Committee and full Council would assume role

With the current term of Council ending in 2022, the Committee felt that this should be a decision of next Council and that the current terms of reference remain in place until the end of the current term.

#### Option 1 Status Quo

The Status Quo option maintains the current Terms of Reference (appendix A) and includes 2 external members. The Finance Committee's main role is to function as an Audit Committee. The Terms of Reference do not provide a significant role to the Committee without the direction of Council.

#### Option 2 Audit Committee

An Audit Committee is an advisory committee to Council. Members should be able to understand the City's internal and external reporting as well as accounting policies and processes. The Committee can function in two ways:

1. Members consist of elected officials only. The size of the committee should be at least 4-5 members, or approximately half of the Council.
2. Members consist of both elected officials and qualified independent members. Council members provide a mix of experience relevant to the City's responsibilities. External qualified members would be recommended to address the potential financial skills gap of elected officials. .

The Audit committee would be supported by the Chief Financial Officer/Treasurer, the Manager of Finance, the CAO and other appropriate staff as required. Meetings would be scheduled to permit review of internal quarterly financial reporting and external annual audit reporting.

#### Option 3 Dissolve Committee with Full Council Assuming the Role

All financial matters within the current Terms of Reference for the Finance Committee currently come to Council for information and/or approval. The full Council would assume the governance role of an audit committee. Items would be dealt with during open Council meetings, unless closed meeting requirements are met. This may enhance public accountability with wider viewing of the meetings by the public.

An audit committee, whether a separate committee or part of Council as a whole, improves transparency around governance and risk management by providing an oversight and advisory role. It strengthens the independence of the audit by reporting directly to Council/Committee.

An audit committee function is recommended by staff. If the current Council has the specific skills, knowledge and expertise Council could transition from a Finance Committee to full Council and assess later if a separate committee is required.

**FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

There are no financial implications associated with this report.

**STRATEGIC PLAN / POLICY IMPACT**

This is an operational matter not articulated in the strategic plan.

**RECOMMENDATION**

It is therefore recommended that Council take the following action:

Resolved that the report of the Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer dated November 21, 2022 concerning the Finance Committee Terms of Reference Review be received and that Council provide direction on the options for the Finance Committee.

Whereas many residents care as to how City Council sets, evaluates, controls and thinks strategically about budgets throughout the fiscal year; and

Whereas the City is committed to being open and transparent with taxpayers – reporting approved quarterly updated financial reports to Council outlining actual expenditures and revenues conforming to budget; and

Whereas it is the responsibility of City Council to implement prudent financial decisions – not for the short but for the long term – ensuring a healthy financial future; and

Whereas it is imperative that matters relating to the finances of the municipality, including, without limitation, the development and implementation of the City's long-term strategic financial plan, internal and external audits, budget policy, budget monitoring, tax policies and policy direction and prioritization relating to financial matters and budgets be thoroughly examined; and

Whereas it may be prudent to eliminate financial policies that may constrict or cause limitations to the City's short and/or long term financial planning;

Now Therefore Be It Resolved that staff review and report back regarding revising the terms of reference for the Finance Committee that may take into consideration the following:

- develop and implement the City's long-term strategic financial plan
- set budget policy
- budget monitoring
- set tax policies
- review revenue and expenditures, comparing figures to budget projections
- establish and approve the City's budget or make recommendations to Council on the final budget
- report quarterly updates to Council

## **BACKGROUND**

The Finance Committee reviewed the Council resolution regarding their Terms of Reference (TOR) and have made several key changes to the TOR for Council to consider.

Finance staff as resources and non-voting members of the Finance Committee are presenting this report on behalf of the voting members of the Finance Committee. The following resolution of the Finance Committee is being brought forward to Council:

Resolved that the Finance Committee's revised Terms of Reference be recommended to City Council for approval.

## **ANALYSIS**

The following are the key changes being recommended to the TOR:

### Committee Composition:

The Committee is recommending the addition of two (2) skills-based external voting members. The committee will then be either 5 or 7 voting members versus the current 3 or 5, of which are currently only members of Council.

Senior Finance staff will be removed from Committee membership as they participate as a resource and not members of the Committee.

### Role and Mandate:

The role and mandate of the Committee has been expanded to include hearing presentations, delegations and receiving correspondence regarding tax policy, capital and operating budgets and other financial policies.

Functions:  
The audit committee function now includes participation in the selection of the auditor through the approved Procurement Policies and Procedures By-law.

Additional Responsibilities:

Several new responsibilities are being added.

- Review and recommendation to Council the priority ranking criteria used for capital budget projects
- Establish the budget input process and expand to include providing a summary and recommended follow up to Council
- Addition of oversight of service level reviews, including proposed changes to existing service levels, or the introduction of new services or programs delivered
- Review funding from other levels of government, operating and capital, and propose strategies to address deficiencies, as directed by Council.

Delegations:

Requests for delegations to present to the Finance Committee will follow the City's Procedural By-law.

The revised Terms of Reference are appended to this report.

The Sault Ste. Marie Chamber of Commerce has provided a message to the Finance Committee regarding the Terms of Reference, a copy of which is appended to this report (Appendix B).

**FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

There are no financial implications relating to changing the Finance Committee Terms of Reference. External members would be voluntary positions with no cost associated.

### Finance Committee Terms of Reference (February 5, 2018)

#### **Committee Composition**

The Finance Committee shall be comprised of 3 or 5 members of Council (voting) and 2 external skill-based members (voting). The Committee Chair is a member of Council.

#### **Meetings**

The Finance Committee shall meet at least 4 times a year based upon Committee approved annual schedule. Additional meetings may be authorized by the Chair at the request of any member of the Committee, at the request of the City's auditors, or at the request of any member of Council.

#### **Role and Mandate**

- The Finance Committee will review and advise City Council on matters relating to financial reporting and assurance that an effective control and governance framework is in place, including but not limited to, hearing presentations, delegations and receiving correspondence regarding tax policy, capital and operating budgets and other financial policies.

#### **Functions of the Finance Committee**

1. Audit Planning and Preparation
  - Review with the auditors the scope of the current year's audit, including areas where the auditors have identified a risk of potential error in the financial condition and/or results of operation
  - Assess whether appropriate assistance is being provided to the auditors by the organizations staff

- Review control weaknesses detected in the prior year's audit, and determine if all practical steps have been taken to overcome them

## 2. Annual Financial Statements

- Receive and review the audited financial statements of the Corporation and report to Council prior to the Council's approval thereof
- Review audited financial statements, in conjunction with the report of the external auditor, and obtain an explanation from management of all significant variances between comparative reporting periods
- Recommend approval of the financial statements to Council
- Enquire about changes in professional standards or regulatory requirements

## 3. Audit Results

- Review the auditor's proposed report on the financial statements
- Review the auditor's management letter documenting weaknesses in internal control systems and commenting on other matters
- Enquire about changes in the financial systems and control systems during the year
- Enquire into the condition of the records and the adequacy of resources committed to accounting and control
- Enquire into major financial risks found by the organization and the appropriateness of related controls to minimize their potential impact
- Meet privately with the auditors to ascertain whether there are concerns that should be brought to the committee's attention

## 4. Auditor's Appointment

- Meet privately with senior management to ensure that management has no concerns about the conduct of the audit
- Enquire as to the experience and capabilities of the individuals being proposed to conduct the audit and their objectivity and independence
- Participate in selection of auditor through approved Procurement Policies and Procedures By-law
- Recommend to Council the auditors to be appointed and the term of the appointment

## 5. Additional Responsibilities Beyond the Scope of Audit

- Review and receive quarterly financial reports. Monitor variances as reported by management and the City's financial performance and recommend approval to Council

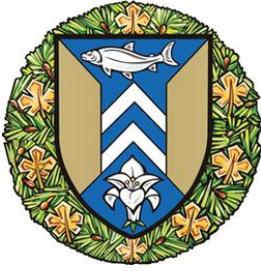

**Purpose**

The purpose of this report is to seek Council approval to advance the boardwalk promenade project, which completes a missing link on the waterfront boardwalk along the eastern wall of the Roberta Bondar Marina.

**Background**

On July 12, 2021, City Council authorized staff to submit an application to FedNor's Canada Community Revitalization Fund program to support the completion of a portion of waterfront boardwalk along the eastern edge of the Roberta Bondar Marina.

On January 31, 2022, Council received notice the application was approved and authorized the signing of an agreement with FedNor to receive \$500,000 to support the boardwalk promenade. Council also authorized a contribution of \$200,000 from the City's Canada Community Building Fund (CCBF) proceeds to support the waterfront boardwalk project.

On August 18, 2022, Council closed the tender for the project with no award as the single bid exceeded the approved budget (\$700,000 budget and tender result was \$1,398,370). In addition, Council re-allocated the CCBF funds to support the award of the Mill Market tender and authorized staff to request FedNor provide an extension of the \$500,000 in funding so that the City could re-tender the project in the spring of 2023.

A copy of all the resolutions mentioned above is provided in Attachment A – Boardwalk Promenade resolutions.

Staff made the request to FedNor to extend the funding agreement to permit the re-tendering of the project in 2023. FedNor has confirmed that they are only able

to extend the funding to March 31, 2023 (original contract had a completion date of October 31, 2022).

Staff engaged with the single bidder of the project to determine if further value management could be undertaken to reduce the cost of the promenade (Procurement Policy 26-Bid in Excess of Project Estimate). The vendor has revised the design of the boardwalk promenade to reduce the cost to \$950,000 plus HST.

**Analysis**

The Boardwalk Promenade has been before Council previously with the list of annual capital projects but the cost was prohibitive. City staff have evaluated different options in an effort to avoid losing the \$500,000 approved by FedNor towards this worthwhile project.

As reported August 18, being the single response for project supply and install, and as Poralu Marine indicates market constraints on securing material and resources, per procurement policy 22 3) e) authorization of single source with Poralu Marine to secure this project and meet the funding deadline indicated within is in the best interests of the City.

The boardwalk in Sault Ste. Marie is one of the most popular features in the community and well visited by residents and tourists alike. The Boardwalk Promenade project would complete a missing link that runs along the eastern edge of the Bondar Marina and provide an accessible solution. It will also provide a better experience for tourists and cruise ship passengers to visit waterfront and marina. Further information and diagrams can be found in Attachment B – Boardwalk Promenade Project.

Given the cost reduction through the value management exercise and the significant funding from FedNor, staff are recommending the City proceed with the project utilizing \$554,365 from prior years uncommitted capital transportation funds.

**Financial Implications**

The additional funding required to award the project is recommended to come from prior years uncommitted capital transportation funds (\$554,365). The table below summarizes project costs and contributions:





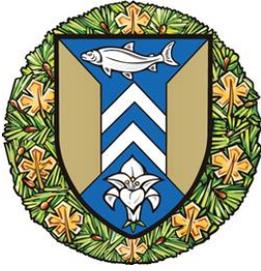

**Purpose**

This report has been prepared to seek Council's approval to add a full time complement for an Aquatic Lead position.

**Background**

There has been a shortage of qualified lifeguards and instructors as a result of the pandemic nation wide.

Recently City staff have provided an update to the public on efforts being made here locally to address the issue (Appendix A). To assist with the shortage, the City of Sault Ste. Marie has implemented several measures to maintain as many services as possible and is committed to bolstering training and recruitment efforts. Some initiatives include:

- Offering Bronze, Instructor and Advance lifeguard courses free of charge with no minimum enrolment
- Adding additional training sessions for certification
- Allowing qualified supervisory staff to fill in as lifeguards and work to train more lifeguards
- Contacting post-secondary students to certify more lifeguards
- Adding additional staff such as deck attendants
- Calling patrons to register as soon as waitlisted spots become available

**Analysis**

City staff have further reviewed avenues to improve programming opportunities to increase swim lessons and pool programming and are recommending the addition of full time Aquatic Lead position. The Pool staffing is currently short 28 (twenty-eight) certified pool staff. This position would help increase certificate rates for lifeguards and instructors, which directly addresses the shortfall. The position will help increase swim lesson programming towards pre-pandemic levels.

In addition, this position would allow more deck attendants under the age of 15 (fifteen) who are certified to aid in providing swim lessons with the Aquatic Lead oversight. The Aquatic Lead would also be present to allow more deck attendants be present on the pool deck for training on an ongoing basis as they pursue their certification.

The Aquatic Lead would also perform the following duties:

**General:**

- Enforce Rules, regulations, and policies as set down by the Provincial Government and City of Sault Ste. Marie.
- Know the location and use of emergency equipment and procedures.
- Know and perform first aid procedures.
- Perform lifeguard duties as required.
- Perform instructor duties as required.
- Conduct water fitness classes as required.
- Assist with lessons and daily operations.

**Administrative:**

- Assist with staff training.
- Complete shift reports.
- Ensure timesheets are completed properly.
- Teach and examine advanced courses and ensure all paper work is submitted accurately.
- Assist with on-deck organization and inventory.

**Supervision:**

- To supervise instructors, lifeguards during scheduled shifts and report problems to Aquatic Supervisor.

The Aquatic Lead position is being proposed to be implemented as temporary full time position from November 22, 2022 to November 21, 2023 at the base Job Class. This will then be brought to budget for a request to add as a permanent position during the budget deliberation February 2023.

**Financial Implications**

The requests can be accommodated within the existing operating budget due to current shortage of positions within the pool area.

**Strategic Plan / Policy Impact**

The recommendation supports the focus area of the Community Strategic Plan for 2021-2024 in a number of ways.

- Within the Service Delivery focus area, it continues to assist in delivering excellent customer service to citizens.

- Calling patrons to register as soon as waitlisted spots become available



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**Purpose**

Starwood Energy Group is requesting a Council support resolution for a proposed solar farm and battery storage facility located on lands south of Base Line in the vicinity of the Airport.

**Background**

This project is proposed as part of the IESO's Expedited Long Term 1 Request For Proposals (LT1 RFP). Through this process, the IESO is presenting a system needs-based approach to provide new capacity to meet Ontario's future energy requirements. Algoma Steel's Electric Arc Furnace transition will increase local energy demand and reliability requirements.

**Analysis**

This project includes two components, a solar farm to generate electricity and a battery storage facility to store energy during off-peak hours and discharge when needed. The project as currently configured would occupy approximately 445ha (+/-1100acres) of land, with solar generating capacity of up to 300MW and battery energy storage of up to 600MW. The ultimate size of the project will depend upon IESO approvals.

A single transmission line will run approximately 7km to a PUC substation at the east end of Yates Avenue. Starwood has indicated that several routes for connection are currently under consideration and that consultations with community stakeholders will be part of the process for determining the final transmission route.

At this preliminary point in the process, Starwood Energy Group has indicated that specifically identifying the subject properties could be detrimental to the overall success of the project. If this project is successful in obtaining IESO approvals, local land use approvals would be required prior to any development occurring.

Although specific properties have not been identified, both the Sault Ste. Marie Official Plan and Zoning By-law 2005-150 are generally permissive in nature when it comes to utilities (battery storage facility), solar farms and associated transmission lines.

Section 4.5.1 of Zoning By-law 2005-150 permits utilities and public services in all zones. The proposed battery storage facility and transmission lines fall under the definition of public utilities and as such, are permitted in all zones. Transmission lines are exempt from height and setback requirements; however, buildings in association with the battery storage facility are subject to the various requirements (setback, height, coverage) of the zone in which they are located.

The solar farm portion of the project does not fall under Section 4.5.1 of the Zoning By-law. 'Commercial Solar Power Installations' are a defined use, permitted in the following zones:

- Rural Area Zone (RA)
- Airport Zone (AIR)
- Light, Medium and Heavy Industrial Zones (M1, M2, M3)

The solar panels are subject to the building regulations (setbacks, lot coverage, etc.) of the zone in which they are located. From a permitted use standpoint, the general area identified by Starwood – South of Base Line in the vicinity of the Airport, is largely zoned Rural Area (RA) and Airport Zone (AIR), where Solar Farms are a permitted use. A large block of land southwest of Gagnon Road is zoned Environmental Management and occupied by the Provincially Significant Shore Ridges Wetland, which is generally undevelopable under current local regulations and Provincial Policies.

### **Summary**

Starwood Energy is seeking Council's preliminary support for a hybrid solar farm and battery storage facility occupying approximately 445ha (+/-1100acres) containing up to 300MW of solar generation and 600MW of battery energy storage.

The proponents are of the opinion that publicly identifying specific subject properties could negatively impact the viability of this project, which is preliminary at this time. Rather, the area south of Base Line in the vicinity of the Airport has been identified, where the predominant Zoning is Rural Area (RA) and Airport Zone (AIR), which both permit, among other things, 'Commercial Solar Power Installations'. As per Section 4.5.1 of Zoning By-law 2005-150, battery storage facilities and associated transmission lines are uses permitted in all zones. By Regulation the PUC is required to remain neutral and they must connect IESO projects to the electrical grid. Given the preliminary nature of this request and the fact that local land use regulations are applicable prior to development, it is recommended that Council support this preliminary application.

### **Financial Implications**

Providing a Council support resolution for this project will not result in any incremental changes to Municipal finances.

### **Strategic Plan / Policy Impact**

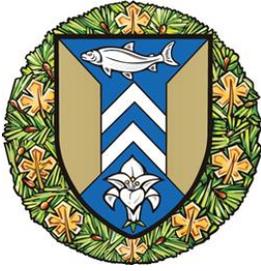

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**Purpose**

Alectra Energy Solutions in partnership with Convergent Energy + Power is requesting a Council support resolution for a proposed battery storage facility at 885R McNabb Street.

**Background**

Ontario is entering a period of emerging electricity system needs, driven by increased demand, the retirement of the Pickering nuclear plant, the refurbishment of other nuclear generating units and expiring contracts with other facilities. The Province’s long-term request for proposals (LT1 RFP) is intended to acquire capacity services to meet system reliability needs. Locally, Algoma Steel’s transition to an Electric Arc Furnace will increase electricity demand.

**Analysis**

Battery Energy Storage Systems (BESS) are rechargeable batteries that store energy from different sources during off-peak hours and discharge the energy when needed. The proposed storage facility at 885R McNabb Street is intended to have up to 20MW of power capacity and a 4-hour energy capacity of 60MWh. The proposed facility would consist of a number of prefabricated structures that house the

equipment. According to Alectra, the proposed development will occupy up to 2,787m<sup>2</sup> (30,000ft<sup>2</sup>) depending upon IESO approvals. The facility will connect to existing electrical infrastructure located upon the subject property north of the proposed facility. There is an existing battery storage facility upon the subject property, albeit on a smaller scale. The property is owned by PUC Distribution Inc. and comments below from PUC note no concerns related to this proposal.

The subject property is 1.64ha (4.03acres) in size, with an existing battery storage facility, a PUC substation and transmission line. The property is designated 'Industrial' on Land Use Schedule C of the Official Plan and Zoned 'Medium Industrial (M2) within Zoning By-law 2005-150. There are no constraints (hazards) or Natural Heritage Features (wetlands, fish habitat, etc.) upon or adjacent to the subject property. At one point various planning documents identified a wetland north and west of the subject property. This wetland was removed from current planning documents about 10 years ago through consultation with the Sault Ste. Marie Region Conservation Authority and Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry. Having said this, a number of online mapping resources still incorrectly identify a wetland.

From a regulatory standpoint, battery storage facilities and any other 'green energy' installations are subject to local regulations, including but not limited to, land use (Planning Act) and building permit approvals. Furthermore, by Regulation, the PUC is required to remain neutral and PUC must connect IESO approved projects to the electrical grid.

As per Section 4.5.1 of Zoning By-law 2005-150, 'Utilities and Public Services are uses permitted in all zones, More specifically:

*'Establishments and uses primarily engaged in providing a public service, such as electrical transmission, sewage, underground pipelines, the works and transmission of natural gas, telephone, cable television, and any other public services, including TransCanada's pipeline. Structures such as transmission wires are exempt from the yard and building regulations of the zone in which they are located, however buildings associated with such uses must conform to the yard and building regulations of the zone in which they are situated.'*

The proposed Battery Storage Facility meets the definition of a 'utility and public service' and as such is permitted in all zones. The prefabricated buildings that will house the batteries are subject to the applicable setbacks of the Medium Industrial (M2) Zoning. On a preliminary basis, it appears that the subject property is capable of supporting the potential maximum 2,787m<sup>2</sup> (30,000ft<sup>2</sup>) footprint, including the provision of relevant setbacks and landscaping requirements. It is however noted that this property does not have any frontage upon a publicly owned and maintained roadway. Existing development upon the site is currently accessed from McNabb Street by a narrow property owned by the PUC. Therefore, if this

application is successful, a Planning Act application will be required to reduce the required frontage from 30m to 0m. On a preliminary basis, it is likely that such an application could proceed by way of a Minor Variance application to the Committee of Adjustment.

### **Summary**

The proposed battery storage facility is an appropriate use of this property. Current zoning provisions permit such facilities in all zones throughout the community, with buildings subject to the setback and yard regulations of the zone in which they are located. The Zoning By-law specifically exempts transmission lines from any setback and building requirements, however a large PUC substation and transmission line is conveniently located upon the subject property adjacent to the proposed battery storage facility. On a preliminary basis, the site is large enough to support the maximum proposed footprint and there are no natural heritage features, hazards or site-specific constraints that will impact this proposal.

Providing a Council support resolution for this project will not result in any incremental changes to Municipal Finances.

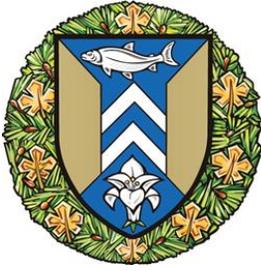

**PURPOSE**

The applicant, Wolfpack Properties (c/o Bryce Fairburn), has submitted an application to legalize the conversion of an illegal triplex by rezoning the subject property to permit a triplex. The triplex consists of a basement unit, ground floor unit, and a second storey unit, each having an independent entrance

**PROPOSED CHANGE**

To rezone 384 Bush Street from Low Density Residential Zone (R3) to Low Density Residential Zone (R3.S) with a Special Exception to, in addition to the uses permitted in an R3 Zone, permit a triplex with the following special provisions:

1. Reduce the required parking from 4 to 3 spaces.
2. Permit 1 parking space to be located in the required exterior side yard (Cornwall Street).

**Subject Property:**

- Location: Situated on the north east corner of the intersection of Bush Street and Cornwall Street.
- Approximate Size: 12 metres (40') of frontage along Bush Street, 38 metres (125') of frontage along Cornwall Street. 0.046 hectares in area.
- Present Use: Illegal triplex.
- Owner: Wolfpack Properties.

**BACKGROUND**

No applications have previously been submitted in association with this property.

**ANALYSIS**

**Conformity with Official Plan**

The property is designated Residential on Land Use Schedule C of the Official Plan. The following land use policies support this application:

#### Housing Policies

HO.1: Opportunities for a full range of housing types shall be provided to meet the present and expected needs of the community.

HO.2: Innovative and alternative residential development standards supporting affordable housing and compact urban form shall be encouraged.

#### Residential Policies

R.1: A mixture of housing types and diversity of ownership and tenure forms shall be encouraged in new development.

R.4: Small scale intensification may be permitted in all residential areas unless adequate supporting infrastructure is not available or significant physical constraints exist.

R.5: Small scale residential intensification may include, but not be limited to, rooming, boarding and lodging houses, apartments in houses, infill development and redevelopment.

The proposal is consistent with the Official Plan.

#### **Conformity with Provincial Policy Statement 2020**

The proposed amendment is consistent as follows:

##### Managing and Directing Land Use to Achieve Efficient and Resilient Development and Land Use Patterns

1.1.1 Healthy, liveable and safe communities are sustained by:

a) promoting efficient development and land use patterns which sustain the financial well-being of the Province and municipalities over the long term;

##### Housing

1.4.3 Planning authorities shall provide for an appropriate range and mix of housing options and densities to meet projected market-based and affordable housing needs of current and future residents of the regional market area by:

c) directing the development of new housing towards locations where appropriate levels of infrastructure and public service facilities are or will be available to support current or will be available to support current and projected needs;

d) promoting densities for new housing which efficiently use land, resources, infrastructure and public service facilities, and support the use of active transportation and transit in areas where it exists or is to be developed;

This proposal is consistent with the Provincial Policy Statement.

### **Conformity with Growth Plan for Northern Ontario 2011**

The proposed amendment is consistent as follows:

*3.4.3 Municipalities are encouraged to support and promote healthy living by providing for communities a range and mix of housing types...*

This proposal is consistent with the Growth Plan for Northern Ontario.

### **COMMENTS**

The subject property is legally recognized as a duplex. This application seeks to legalize the third unit, thereby converting the property to a triplex. The basement, ground floor, and upper storey would each have one dwelling unit with its own separate entrance.

The existing garage can accommodate two parking spaces. An additional space adjacent to the garage will be used as a third space. To preserve general aesthetics, amenity space and trees on the property, it is recommended to reduce the required number of parking spaces from 4 to 3. Permitting a parking space to be located in the exterior side yard is appropriate given the relatively wide City-owned boulevard. The availability of on-street parking can accommodate visitor parking needs.

The trend of reducing parking requirements to encourage infill development and density goals has been previously supported by staff and Council. Staff are also in the process of undertaking a review of parking requirements to determine if they still align with user demand, housing development trends, and anticipated land use policy.

This proposal represents a nominal level of intensification that is compatible with the existing uses and the established pattern and built form of the area. No neighbourhood impacts are anticipated with the approval of this application. Provincial and municipal policy and plans also encourage intensification where appropriate.

It is worth noting that the Province is currently in the consultation phase for the proposed Bill 23 – More Homes Built Faster Act. A number of land use related amendments are being proposed to increase housing supply. One such amendment includes increasing housing supply by permitting up to 3 new units in new and existing houses. In addition, Council recently passed a resolution asking staff to explore permitting up to 4 units as a matter of right in urban residential areas. It is anticipated that in the near future, rezoning applications such as this will be permitted as of right and will not be required to gain Council's approval.

## **CONSULTATION**

The applicant hosted a non-statutory neighbourhood meeting on September 29, 2022 at City Hall. The applicant mailed invitations to all property owners within 120 metres (400') of the subject property. One person attended the meeting.

Statutory public notices were mailed to all neighbouring properties within 120m (400') of the subject property on October 28, 2022. The notice that was mailed to property owners is attached to this report. The notice was also advertised on the City website and in the Sault Star on October 25 and October 29 respectively.

### **Public Comments**

The individual that attended the neighbourhood meeting sought additional information about the proposal, and after learning more about it from the applicant, became satisfied with the proposal.

The individual noted concerns about flooding in the area. This issue is not related to the rezoning application nor will be impacted by the approval of the application.

No additional questions or comments were received from the public at the time of writing this report.

### **Application Circulation**

As part of the application review, this proposal was circulated to City divisions and external agencies for detailed technical review and comment. The following departments/agencies commented on this application:

No comments were received during application circulation.

Approval of this application will not result in any incremental changes to municipal finances.

### BY-LAW NO. 2022-180

**COUNCIL PROCEDURE**: A by-law to provide for the appointment of persons to act in the place of the Mayor during an absence or vacancy during the 2022-2026 term of City Council for The Corporation of the City of Sault Ste. Marie and to repeal By-law 2019-181.

**WHEREAS** pursuant to section 241 of the *Municipal Act, 2001*, S.O. 2001, c.25, as amended, the head of council, except where otherwise provided, shall preside at all meetings of council;

**WHEREAS** Section 23.1 of the *Municipal Act, 2001* authorizes a municipality to delegate its powers and duties under that statute or any other Act, to a person or body, subject to certain restrictions (none of which relate to power and duties exercised by acting Mayor at the City of Sault Ste. Marie);

**AND WHEREAS** THE Mayor is the head of council;

**NOW THEREFORE** the Council of The Corporation of the City of Sault Ste. Marie **ENACTS** as follows:

1. If the Mayor of the City of Sault Ste. Marie is absent from the municipal area, is absent through illness, or the office is vacant for any period of time during any term specified in Column 1 of Schedule "A" attached to this By-law, then the person named in Column 2 of Schedule "A" opposite the relevant term in which the Mayor is absent or the office is vacant shall act in the place of the Mayor during such absence or vacancy until the relevant term expires. While so acting, such person has and may exercise all the rights, powers and authority of the Mayor.
2. If the person acting during any term in the place of the Mayor pursuant to Section 1 of this By-law is not replaced by the Mayor and the term which appears opposite that person's name expires, then the person named in Column 2 of Schedule "A" opposite the term which next succeeds the then expired term shall act in the place of the Mayor in accordance with Section 1.
3. If persons in Column 2 of Schedule "A" are unable to act for any reason, then Council may, by resolution, appoint a member(s) of Council to act in the place of the Mayor for such time as Council determines in lieu of the relevant person named in Column 2 of Schedule "A". Failing such resolution, the person whose name next follows in Column 2 of Schedule "A" and who is able to act shall act, subject to Section 1 hereof, for the

term which precedes the term opposite his/her name and during the term which is opposite his/her name in the place of the Mayor for the absence or vacancy concerned in lieu of the prior relevant person(s) named in Column 2.

4. There shall be no remuneration paid to any member who may be acting in the place of the Mayor pursuant to this By-law, except for the usual remuneration paid to such member as a Councillor.

5. **BY-LAW 2019-181 REPEALED**

By-law 2019-181 is hereby repealed.

6. **EFFECTIVE DATE**

This by-law shall be effective from the date of its final passing.

**AND WHEREAS** the Agreement contains a payment schedule of \$400,000.00 for four (4) years;

**AND WHEREAS** DSSAB has informed the City that a funding reduction of \$100,000.00 only enables DSSAB to transfer to the City funds in the amount of \$300,000.00 on last payment date under the Agreement, being February 1, 2023;

**AND WHEREAS** the effect of the lump sum transfer to the City by DSSAB is to ensure funding is directly allocated to the acquisition of a transit pass to the benefit of any qualified applicant as determined by DSSAB;

**AND WHEREAS** despite the aforesaid reduction, the City can continue to meet transit pass allocation and ensure the original intention of the Agreement is followed;

**AND WHEREAS** the parties hereto desire to continue in essence the Agreement;

**NOW THEREFORE** in consideration of \$5.00 to the City from DSSAB, receipt of which is acknowledge by the City, and the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, and the continuance of all terms and conditions as set out in the Agreement, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. Section 3 of the Agreement is removed and replaced with the following:

3. DSSAB agrees to pay to the City Four Hundred Thousand (\$400,000.00) Dollars per year, except for on February 1, 2023 wherein the said amount will be reduced by One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars, in the Term in exchange for the Transit passes the City provides to DSSAB as set out in this Agreement. The said payment from DSSAB to the City shall be paid in accordance with the following payment schedule:
